AUDITOR'S REPORT SHOWS COUNTY IN FAVORABLE FINANCIAL SHAPE

The financial condition of Oakland County was favorably reported to the board of supervisors Friday by Willis M. Brewer, chairman of the county board of auditors.

The county had in its treasury on Aug. 1, \$3,016,095.92, he said, and showed that several county funds have a large balance. The general fund budget of the county called for the raising of \$1,240,146.53 and the tax collection to Aug. 31 amounted to \$812,571.75 leaving still due the fund in uncollected taxes \$427,674.78. Absence of this sum left the general fund with an overdraft of \$1,060,146.89 for the month of August.

Mr. Brewer informed the board of supervisors that the board commenced its regular session in October, 1922 for the building of a number of cottages on a pay-as-you-go plan. The money that went into this fund was obtained from the sale of bonds which brought over \$250 per foot. The bonds were sold by Mr. Newcomb for investment purposes.

Mr. Brewer said that \$46,700 would be realized from this year's tax and that the county would be able to pay off its debt to Dec. 31 cutting the overdraft from \$1,060,146.89 to \$1,013,446.89.
