FERNDALE IS NEXT FOR BALDWIN HI

Villagers Swamp St. Frederick's in Practice Game

ALL SUBS GET IN GAME

Having sampled St. Frederick at the Cranbrook school field last Friday by a score of 22-0, the football squad is completing practice today for tomorrow's encounter with Ferndale.

Birmingham meets the Lincoln high school gridiron at 1 p. m. The strategy of its forward wall and interference, whose smashing drives opened the way for the ball carriers of stopped advance when in fact it was Coach Johnson's warriors were able to average two touchdowns a quarter, to make a total of eight against the Pontiac team.

A multitude of substitutions, including every member of the varsity squad was used in the Cranbrook contest by Coach Johnson. Practically the whole team was changed twice during the four quarters of play.

Captain Philip Henry with O. and Root, among the regulars who participated looked the best in the line. Capt. Henry scored his first touchdown of the season in the game when he shifted from guard into end position and caught a pass over the goal line in the second quarter.

Cox in Long Run
The longest gain of the game was Cox's sprint of 57 yards around end, resulting in a touchdown in the fourth period, the only scoring made. Cox's plunking was one of the many features of the game. Cox ran recorded his first marker 57, the unassisted battle when Birmingham had received a punt from the Pontiac team early in the first quarter. He was given the ball twice in succession and raced 59 yards, on another advance.

The second six point tally was scored by Brown after St. Frederick had been pushed back towards her goal line on her own fumble. After a punt Brown featured the march to the goal plunging the oval over with no difficulty. Henry's touchdown came next, scored in the second period on a pass from Doherty which netted 12 yards. A cleary offensive attack by the Maroon and White led to the scoring position.

While the whistle sounded for the half, Doherty took it upon himself to cross the bar while Brown, after intercepting a pass attempt by Pontiac and running 20 yards, a pass for a goal point. Cox to Brown had netted one point on the first score and Root had placed kicked another on Henry's touchdown bringing the score to 26-0 at the half.

Thomson vs. Doherty
Thomson vs. Doherty in the next counter when he performed a neat broken field run which began around end but reversed twice to elude tacklers. This netted 37 yards. A few minutes before his half, Doherty to Brown pass scored the goal point. Three minutes after St. Frederick took the oval on the kickoff, Doherty intercepted another pass and this time gained 14 yards on each the goal line and score.

Brown found his opportunity to add to the points tallied when he caught a pass from Cox and netted 20 yards to make a touchdown. On the same pass, Cox to Brown, scored as chairman.

St. Frederick found no chance to score throughout the encounter. However, Coach Gordon, Granger, Talbot and Gillen appeared commendably at times.
