**BOWLING CLUB OPENS MONDAY**

Blackmer's New Establishment in Theater Building Ready To Start

Members of the village commission and of the Rotary and Exchange clubs have been invited to the formal opening Monday evening of the new Birmingham Bowling and Recreation rooms in the basement of the Kunsky-Birmingham headquarters building on Woodward avenue. According to plans of George Blackmer, owner of the bowling establishment, members of the commission will officially open the place by rolling the first ball down one of the eight alleys.

The alleys, which are rapidly becoming completion today, are said by Mr. Blackmer to have two features not possessed by any other bowling alleys in the state. The first is an indirect lighting system, which he says will not throw shadows on the alleys and the other is a steel foundation under the Woodward alleys. Both, he declares, are factors which are great improvements over the previous other lighting facilities and foundations in this kind of place.

Mr. Blackmer has been engaged in this business in Birmingham for two years, having operated a similar bowling alley on the west side of Woodward avenue during that time. He sold the business that June and since that time has been making preparations for the new establishment.

The interior is to be finished in green and white, two colors, he says, which are easiest on the eyes of persons bowling. He also plans to add two more alleys to the eight within two months.

The room is 118x60 feet and the equipment is costing approximately \$25,000, he says. He has signed a lease for 10 years.

**NEW GARAGE TO BE BUILT**

Evans-Legg Planning Large Structure On North Woodward

Preliminary details for a new large garage building to be constructed at Woodward avenue and Ravine road in the spring are being worked out today by officials of the Evans-Legg Motor company who anticipate removal from their present quarters on Woodward avenue south of Maple avenue in one year.

The company purchased this week 95 feet of Woodward avenue frontage at Ravine road from Mrs. L. E. Holton at the rate of \$400 a front foot.

The new building is planned to be one of the most modern garages in the state and will have two stories, with the second floor to be used for storage. Sales rooms and a repair department will be on the main floor, R. R. Evans said.

**Five Men Are Fined For Apple Thefts**

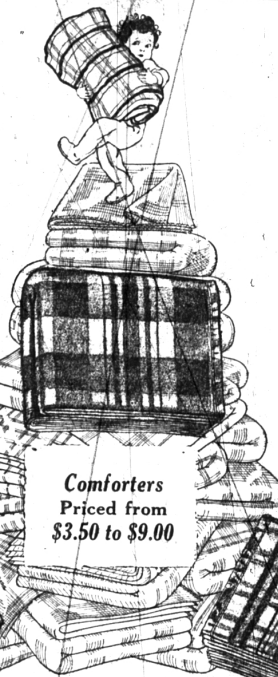

**HOME IS SOUGHT FOR SMALL CHILD**

Policemen Must Find Boarding Place For Infant; Duties Told

Duties of a policeman are numerous and varied. They run the gamut from searching women who have been arrested to finding boarding places for babies. A case of the latter sort has developed upon Birmingham's policeman, Mrs. A. D. Jardine, 511 Ann street, today. Mrs. Jardine has in her care a three-months old baby for whom she would like to find a boarding place. The baby's mother must work, Mrs. Jardine said, and she desires to place the baby during the day.

Mrs. Jardine co-operates with the school authorities, the health department and the Community House as well as with the police station. She accompanies an officer when a woman is apprehended. She is on duty 24 hours a day, and frequently is called from her bed at 2 a. m. to do her duty, she said.

Another of the policeman's duties is to try to keep domestic peace, between husband and wife and mother and child. "I find that a lack of understanding is often the reason for family rifts, and an outside influence can smooth out the wrinkles. This is particularly true of mothers and growing daughters and sons. At present I have several children, ranging in age from 12 to 16 years of age, and I find that it is not only when I feel that the cases are hopeless that I file a petition in the juvenile court. That is the last resort."

The growth of Birmingham has brought with it new sociological problems and the continued growth will bring more of them, Mrs. Jardine said. "And the role of the policeman will become proportionately larger and more important," she concluded.
