PEACE LEAGUE REPORT MADE

Mrs. George T. Hendrie Returns From National Executive Board Meeting

Increased enthusiasm for the work being done by the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom and special emphasis on the work in China, featured the meeting of the National executive board of the new headquarters in Philadelphia, Pa., last week. Mrs. George T. Hendrie presented Michigan at the meeting and at the formal opening ceremonies of the new headquarters. The Pennsylvania branch of the league, returning early this week from the affair, some 20 women, representing 10 states, were in attendance at the meeting.

Plans for the proposed sending of a commission representing the league to China, in order to carry on the league work there, were discussed in some detail. According to present intention, the commission will make a tour of most of the world in the course of its work. It will stop at the various branch headquarters in this country and tell of the work. Special attention will be given to the Pennsylvania headquarters, at the branches preparatory to this lecture tour, Mrs. Hendrie said. Petitions to be presented to President Coolidge, urging arbitration in international questions, are being circulated today by members of the league. After the formal opening of the Pennsylvania headquarters, at 1525 Locust street, Philadelphia, a dinner honoring Miss Jane Addams, speaker at the meeting, will be given. Mrs. Hendrie is the daughter of the former president William Howard Taft, who is now president of Bryan May College, was toast mistress. Mrs. Manning laid tribute to Miss Addams' untiring labor in the cause of peace and emphasized the necessity for spreading the area of influence of the league.

Encourages Activity. "It is too easy for us to let things drift," Mrs. Manning said. "We are too prone to 'let well enough alone,' as we say, when it comes to the things we can remember when I was a child being about the fire and brimstone that awaited everybody who did what he pleased. I used to wonder why it was that grown-ups could take the situation so calmly. They didn't seem so very much worried about it. Today this same reaction comes to me in connection with the question war. Grown-ups don't say enough attention. And it is our duty, as an international league of peace, to make people realize the seriousness of the necessity of doing away with war."
