For a number of years past, due to the seasonal scarcity of water in Birmingham, it has been the policy of the village commission to refuse water outside the village limits, except in territories that have evidenced a willingness to become annexed. This policy was outlined to the Golphurst people and they, in turn, have circulated and filed a petition for annexation, to be voted upon later.

In the meantime, however, the village commission is confronted with two problems: First, does Birmingham desire to annex more territory? An affirmative answer to this question would automatically provide an easy agreement to enter into the water contract. Second, does Birmingham want to provide water for a territory that village yet a part of Birmingham, and take a chance on the voters' as yet unmade decision to favor the annexation?

Manager Parry favors the sale of water on the basis that Golphurst is willing to come into the village; he says that any contract given to Golphurst can be terminated legally, should the annexation fall through.

The problem will be thoroughly discussed next Tuesday night.
