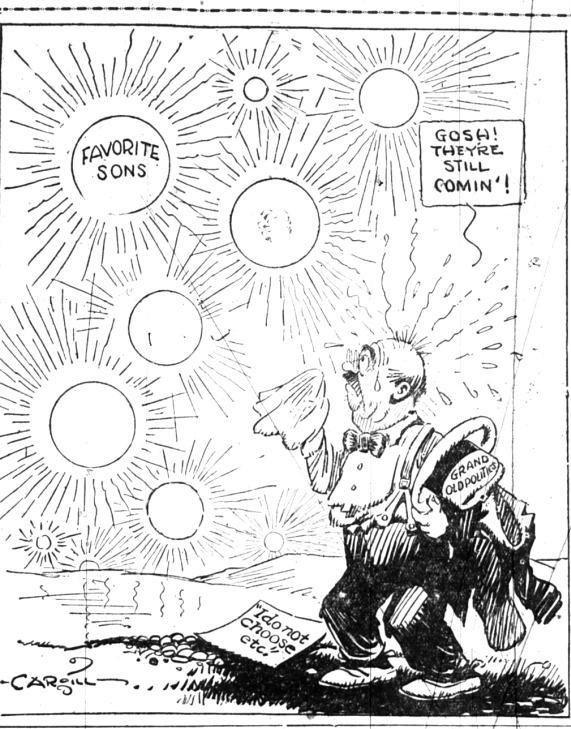
But McCann stood up, and when Mrs. Dempsey looked again the boys were in a clinch and just slapping each other around.
