Soon To Be Known As Business And Professional Women's Club

"We feel that the club has made itself well known in Birmingham and desirable enough to be put on this new basis, similar to that of larger clubs, like the Rotary club."

A beginning on this re-organization was made at the first full meeting of the club last Thursday and the Community House and other activity along this line expected to take place at the meeting this noon. The other officers of the club for this fall are Mildred Spicer, secretary, and Mabel Luscombe, treasurer.

The guest list included, besides the Birmingham representatives, Miss Florence Pacy, from northern Michigan, state vice president; Miss Lucy Dell Henry, of Lansing, state treasurer; Mrs. Lloyd G. Kirby, of Flint, second vice-president; and Miss Marjorie Donovan, state publicity chairman, who this year will edit the National Letter, a chronicle of events in the various branches of the association throughout the state.

Prizes Awarded In Flower Show

Edgar B. Whitcomb, Mrs. John S. Newberry and Mrs. Russell Alford were the prize winners at the two day flower show of the Grosse Pointe and Eastern Michigan Horticultural Society held Thursday and Friday at the Neighborhood club, Grosse Pointe Farms.

Mrs. Whitcomb took the Mary Schling medal for the largest display of dahlias and won the prize for the best flower show. One of his entries measuring 10 inches in diameter.

Five classes of cut flowers, including different arrangements of perennials, flowering shrubs and annuals, make up the first group under the direction of Thomas Hinds, president of the organization. The show will be opened to the public at 1 p. m. although judging will begin about noon.

A committee, acting as judges, under the direction of Thomas Hinds, are included in the second group, but the dahlia group has 10. Poppoms, peony type, cactus or hybrid cactus and various arrangements of dahlias are included here.

Four classes of gladiolus include various arrangements of these flowers, and in the 15 classes of fruits are one collection of outdoor fruits, one of apples, one of peaches and one of white grapes, two of apples, two of pears, one of peaches, one of melons and one of watermelons.

The vegetable group is the largest, having 30 classes, which include two collections of vegetables, one of pumpkins, one of beans, one of cauliflower, one of cabbage, two of carrots, one of celery, one of cucumbers, two of corn, one of egg plant, one of leek, one of lettuce, two of onions, one of parsnips, one of peas, one of peppers, one of potatoes, one of pumpkin, one of radishes, one of Brussels sprouts, one of tomatoes, one of vegetable marrow, one of two of squash.

All entries were to be in the hands of the secretary of the society three days before the exhibition, the committee announced, and they must be in position by 12 a. m. Saturday.
