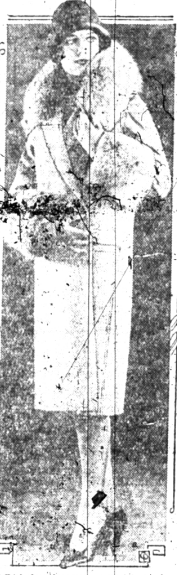

MENU HINT

Today's Recipes
Liver with Creamed Fried Onions. Two slices calf's liver, one quart onions sliced, four table spoons flour, six slices bread, two egg yolks, salt and pepper, two pint one-half cups milk. Cut the liver into six pieces, cover with a boiling water and let stand five minutes. Drain and remove the skin and veins. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and broil or saute for five minutes in a small amount of fat, adding more as needed.
