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COUZENS' 'GIFT' SPEEDS WORK OF NEW SCHOOL

Bath Consolidated, Dynamited By Maniac, To Be Reconstructed

\$75,000 CHECK GIVEN

BATH, Mich., Sept. 21.—Work under way today on the construction of a new school building to take the place of that destroyed by dynamite May 15 when 40 children, teachers and villagers lost their lives. The construction of the new Bath Consolidated School is made possible by the receipt of a check for \$75,000 from Senator James Couzens of Bloomfield Hills.

A saddened and somewhat timid group of children, most of whom were in the explosion, has returned to classes being held in stores and churches of Bath. The new building will be ready for occupancy Jan. 1.

It will include a 60 foot wing to be added to part of the former structure that was not altogether demolished when Andrew Kehler, a manual farmer, set off the dynamite.

More class rooms are included in the new structure to provide accommodation for a larger assortment of classes than was possible in the old building.

When the prepared group in President Coolidge's own party pulled the chief executive's "waiting policy" as to warping expansion, last winter, with a demand for more real reforms, instead of crassness, simply "an expansion" of the insurance in the house of representatives, was Speaker Clegg's Majority Floor Manager Tilton of Connecticut, Chairman Butler of the naval affairs committee, from Pennsylvania, Congressman Kahn and Congressman Britten of Illinois.

Of this quietest Mrs. Kahn wasn't the least influential.

That a woman's at a certain advantage in the militant ranks, in a clash of this sort, probably can't be denied.

The supposition is, perhaps, that her sex will shrink from the thought of international violence, though there are plenty of assertives who say the truth's quite otherwise and when one of its representatives takes the preparedness side of the argument, maybe it's more noticeable than it is in a great hulking man, like Longworth, Tilton, Butler or Britten.

Mrs. Kahn, however, lays no claims to extra consideration because she's a woman. All she does claim to count for is just a regular member of congress.

The California congresswoman, he it understood, denies that she's a militarist. She isn't for war at any price, anyway.

"But if we're to have an army and navy at all," she said, just after the rampus in the house of representatives last session, "I'm in favor of the genuine articles as far as they go—not blueprint ships and tin soldiers."

This, remember, was before the last Geneva armament limitations conference had gone to glory.

If that's the way she's about it, then, the big navy folk are saying among themselves, she feels more emphatically must she feel the same way since England's negotiators have refused to put the soft pedal on their warship-building program.

This is a safe bet to anyone who ever talked with Congresswoman Kahn.

Let anybody who imagines that Mrs. Kahn, of California, being a woman, doesn't know all about lawmaking and debate and parliamentary tick-tacks and all the congressional in-and-outs that any politician ever thought of—yes, and armies and navies—let him and himself disabuse his mind of any such erroneous idea as promptly as possible.

Mrs. Kahn's husband, the late Julius Kahn, served 24 years in the house of representatives as the chairman of the committee on military affairs, too, a considerable part of it.

ROCHESTER SPAN NEAR COMPLETION

Expect To Open Bridge To Traffic During November; Concrete Pouring To Start

The new Rochester bridge is expected to be opened to traffic in November, according to engineers who plan on pouring the last of the concrete early in October.

Progress towards completion is rapid. Workmen are now engaged in pouring the roadway, last big job on the structure. Erection of the hand rail on the west side is practically finished.

The viaduct is said to be one of the largest in the state, constructed by the state highway department and will represent an investment of approximately \$2,500,000, according to the engineers. It connects the brows of two hills, between which the Clinton River runs, and eliminates one of the worst grades in the county.

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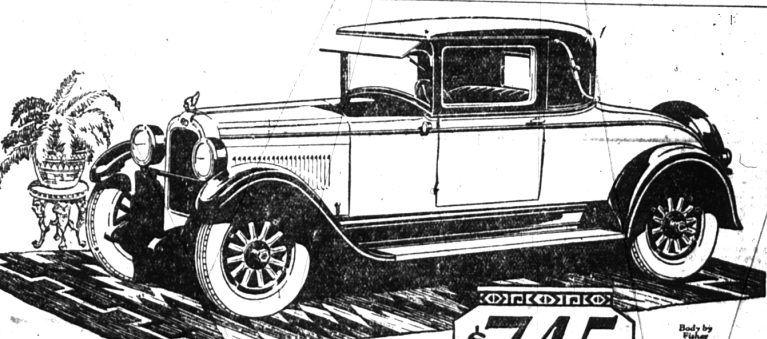
