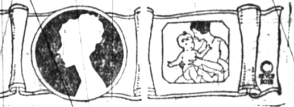

## Motherhood Trials Trained Governor

Even such women as governesses are made of can give way to genuine feminine bursts of tears under the trials of motherhood.

Such is the admission of Mrs. Nellie Taylor Ross of Wyoming, one of the two women to become chief executive of an American commonwealth.

Writing the story of her life Mrs. Ross reveals several significant incidents of her early life as wife of the struggling young Cheyenne lawyer whom she was to succeed as governor, particularly one in which a governor-to-be threw herself on the bed and went like any other harried girl-wife.

"Let any young mother, overwhelmed with the responsibility of one well baby, picture the situation," she says, describing her trials in caring for three babies, all under three years of age. "An inexperienced, delicate mother, threw prostrate upon the bed beside those wailing, colicky babies, and from sheer exhaustion and despair mingling her tears with theirs. I still remember one such hour, and the distinct feeling that which could not be ignored, couped or postponed, challenged and strengthened every resource I possessed, and made ultimately of the weak and inefficient young girl that I had been, a self-reliant and useful woman."

Two other factors, her article reveals, also prepared her for success as a political executive. They were a loyal interest in her husband's affairs and a constant pursuit of intellectual development through reading and participation in women's club activities.

"At the beginning of our married life every new case was a real event to the almost listless young lawyer and his wife," she says. "So eager was my interest that when he wanted to test his theories by discussion with me he could depend on finding a ready listener and one unflinchingly expressing any fallacies I thought I could detect. I did not then realize that I was absorbing an understanding of law and government that was to prove invaluable in later years."

## HOUSEHOLD HINTS

**MENU HINT**

The first entertaining for the autumn are apt to be less elaborate or too expensive so as to set a mark or two which will be difficult to serve a charming luncheon but do not want it to be too elaborate.

Let's make the color scheme those lovely orange-pink shades that are seen in so many of the fall garden flowers, and I would, if possible, use garden rather than hot house flowers for decoration.

**Chicken a la King**—Fortunately chickens are apt to be less expensive at this time of year than at any other. Cut up and creamed in this way they go further than almost any other kind of meat and almost everyone likes chicken. The potatoes give it the edge. It is not necessary to have a spring chicken. After stewing, remove the ribs and cut into fine pieces. Make a rich white sauce adding mushrooms and pineapples cut in small pieces, to which chicken is added of course.

**Arrange celery, radishes and olives** so as to make a pretty color contrast. I have purposely omitted salad from the menu so as to save work for the hostess. It may be added if liked.

**Caramel Bavarian Cream**—Two cups milk, two tablespoons sugar, three-fourths cup sugar, one-fourth cup boiling water, two cups whipping cream, two egg yolks, one teaspoon vanilla, two tablespoons gelatine, one-half cup cold water. Mix egg yolks with two tablespoons sugar and add to scalded milk. Caramelize the three-fourths cup of sugar and dissolve in the one-fourth cup boiling water. Add the soft custard. Add the gelatin which has been softened in the one-half cup cold water. Strain into a bowl and set in ice water. When it begins to thicken, add vanilla and the whipped cream. Mold and chill.

## WITH WOMEN OF TODAY

First-class hospitals all over the United States are demanding the services of medical-social workers. They study the social and economic status of patients, interpret them to the doctor, and help explain the doctor's advice to the patient and his family.

In view of this demand, Miss Agnes Schroeder, of Cleveland, O., is directing a training course at Western Reserve university which will prepare young women for this service.

Miss Schroeder was once supervisor for Lakeside hospital, Cleveland, for six years.

"Our work might be compared to that of the old family physician," she says. "When he adapted his advice to suit the circumstances of his patient and gave counsel that was asked in faith outside of the purely physical. We deal largely with the patients of the wards and the dispensary of the hospital. We want to keep going that intimate human knowledge which has been in the practice of medicine for centuries, but which tends to be subordinated to the purely scientific in large institutions."

Miss Schroeder explains that "medical-social service was first started in 1905 in the Massachusetts General hospital, by Richard Cabot, a doctor who knew social work."

**RABBIT**

Melt one tablespoon butter, add two tablespoons flour, mix smooth, add slowly one cup milk, season with salt and paprika. When smooth and boiling add from one-half to one cup cheese grated or cut in small pieces. Stir until cheese is melted and serve at once over crackers or toast.

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
