HILLS VILLAGE FINES ARE \$310

No Jail Sentences Imposed For Law Violations During Month

Ten offenses in Bloomfield Hills Village during August brought \$310 in fines and no jail sentences, in Judge Floyd S. Buck's justice

court, according to his report today. A \$75 fine was paid by a drunk driver, whose operator's license was also revoked for six months, and another \$75 fine was paid by a reckless driver. Three drunks drew two \$20 and one \$30 fine and a \$15 fine was paid on a charge of drunk and disorderly. Another reckless driver paid \$20 fine and \$80 damages to another car, and a third paid a \$10 fine. A disorderly charge brought a \$35 fine, and passing a red light drew one for \$10.

AGED WOMAN DIES AT HOME

Mrs. Emily Bugbee, Native Of Southfield, Succumbs At 82

Funeral services were held at 11 a. m. Monday for Mrs. Emily Bugbee, native of Southfield, and for the past 30 years a resident of Birmingham, who died at her home, 308 Purdy street, Friday night. She was 82 years old. Death came as the result of complications incident to old age.

Mrs. Bugbee was born in Southfield, but lived for many years in Pennsylvania. Her brother, H. Orlando Pike, of Detroit, was staying with her at the time of her death. She also leaves another brother, L. L. Lomanie, Pike, of Farmington. Her husband, Warren Bugbee, died a few years ago. The Rev. Floyd Emerson Loge, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, officiated at the funeral services. Burial was in Franklin cemetery.

NEW AMBULANCE SERVICE TO START

S. O. Wiley Bell Will Inaugurate Convenience Early In October

The first ambulance service in Birmingham will be started, Oct. 10 by S. O. Wiley Bell with the arrival of a new, large Sayers & Sewell insured car. The body of the machine, which is being specially constructed, will be finished in a soft color. It will have a door at both the rear and side so the patient may be lifted into the compartment from either position.

It is to combine the latest improvements for ambulance cars and the springs are said to be highly perfected. Mr. Bell plans to start the service immediately upon arrival of the car.

BELGIAN FISHING BOAT NAMED FOR SOCIALIST

With what the Belgian labor papers describe as impressive ceremonies, the members of the cooperative fishing enterprise as it is tent recently named one of their new motor fishing boats the Giacomo Matteotti, in honor of the Secretary of the Unitarian Socialist Party of Italy, murdered by fascists on June 10, 1924. Several years ago one of the vessels of the cooperative was named the Jean Jaures, after the French Socialist leader who was murdered by a half-crazy Nationalist just as the World War began.

Thousands of workers of all crafts participated in the recent ceremony. Among the visitors were Senators Vandenberg and Van Scoor and young Socialists from Brussels.

AIR DERBY KEEPS TROPHY MOVING

Van Orman, center, of Akron, turned it over to Hulbert, who accepted it in behalf of Detroit, but Van Orman, who is the present holder of the prize by virtue of his victory in the 1926 race, expects to bring it to Akron again for another year. Germany, Italy, Belgium, France, Spain and Switzerland will have entrants in the race.

CRIME IS LOW FOR MONTH

Eighteen In Seven Homes Are Major Crimes Here In August

Seven homes were robbed in Birmingham during August, four children were lost and there were 15 automobile accidents, according to the monthly report of the police department issued today. The amount of crime here is considered small.

More persons were arrested for speeding than for any other law violation. They numbered 56. The next highest number were arrested for violating a traffic signal. Twenty-four were taken on the count.

The number of persons seeking lodging in the police station was smaller this month than previously, falling off to four who sought shelter. Only one automobile was reported stolen while police found two that were abandoned here.

Inebriates for the month numbered seven and six other persons were arrested by police here for driving their cars while under the influence of intoxicating liquor. One man was held on a charge of desertion and his trial will come up in circuit court, Pontiac, this month.
