

53 CANDIDATES REPORT FOR GRID SQUAD

Spirits Of Baldwin Students Soar As Football Season Starts

PRACTICE TILT FRIDAY

Prospects of a successful football season for Baldwin High School are bright today following the start of practice by 53 students who reported to Coach

George F. Johnson Tuesday. This is the largest squad in the history of the school and the morale of the candidates for births on the regular team was so high, as they started their preliminary work at Barnum field, that the keenest of competition is promised.

He asked that members of the squad remain steadfast in their desire for positions until it becomes necessary to exceed the size of the squad, and he declared all candidates will be given an equal chance to show their merit.

Many of these new men on the squad are expected to be pitted against Berkeley High School in a practice game scheduled for Friday afternoon at the Barnum field.

Material for the backfield is said to be more complete than for the line at present. Tackles and guards, to fill the places of several players who graduated, must be selected from the new material.
