WHAT TO WEAR, AND HOW TO WEAR IT

At last we're getting away from the uniform hat. Last season we made a start in that direction. This season we put it definitely across. No longer are the shop windows full of little hats that look as much alike as the men's. There is variety in size, material and trimming.

Pictured here are a number of the new hats, which prove the assertion made above. Natural hair (liberty) is used for No. 1. It has an "eye line" brim, cut and turned in front to give that effect. The rose ornament is the color of cafe au lait—coffee with milk.

A tiny irregular turban made of an off-the-face model turban in beige and black braid (No. 2) has the popular nose veil with an amusing pair of wings perched at the summit of the crown. They are made especially for this type of hat.

The eye-line brim is again featured in No. 3, a hat of linen braid. The brim is faced with two shades of belting ribbon and trimmed with flowers of kid in the same shades as the ribbon.

No. 4 is a shady hat of white felt—mushroom shaped—with a slashed side. It is faced and banded with stitched pique, and has a comically tiny under the brim at the quill-like ornament. Then there is No. 5, which is a large ball-burlap shape which has a tendency towards the bandeau effect. It is trimmed and faced with Dutch lace, while two silk roses nestle just beneath the brim at the quill-like ornament. Then there is No. 6, a natural bangkok, in slightly mushroom shape, trimmed with brown bolting ribbon. HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Every meal is the better for a something crisp and fresh to eat with the cooked dishes. The early onions and radishes, lettuce and cress are all good and should be served freely to the adult members of the family.

Fresh Cod with Tartar Sauce Baked Potatoes Escalloped Tomatoes
Radishes Green Onions Rhubarb Pie Coffee

Today's Recipes
Fresh Cod—Dip cod in flour, then squeeze lemon juice on each piece. Then roll in egg and bread crumbs and fry in shallow fat, being sure to cook thoroughly.

Tartar Sauce—Use four table-spoons mayonnaise and one teaspoon each of chopped, stuffed olives, minced onions and capers.

Escalloped Tomatoes—Butter a baking dish. Heat a can of tomatoes and pour half into the baking dish, then a layer of buttered bread crumbs, then the rest of the tomatoes and another layer of crumbs. Dot with butter and bake until the top is nicely browned.

Suggestions
When "Best" Dishes
Cover them with a "wet" set of dishes to be used often, but not daily, preliminary washing may be omitted if they are covered carefully. Pack the dishes as compactly as possible on two or three shelves. Then measure the length, width and height of the shelf space used. Make covers as for a deep chest of required dimensions, from fancy cloth to match the kitchen color scheme. Fit over the shelves and they will be free from dust when needed.

Try Steel Wool
One housewife suggests using steel wool with the soap that comes with it—such as is used to clean aluminum to clean badly stained windows.

Orange Charlotte
(Mrs. Mary Morton's Daily Tested Recipe)
One-fourth cup gelatine, one-third cup boiling water, juice of one lemon, one pint whipped cream, one-third cup cold water, one cup sugar, one cup orange juice and pulp. Soak gelatine in cold water prior to boiling water.

FRANCE WOULD USE WOMEN ON JURIES

Though women do not vote in France and only recently were admitted to the bar and to the Ecole Normale Supérieure, a measure introduced recently in Parliament would accord to them the right to sit upon juries.

M. Baranton, the Parisian deputy who puts forward the proposal, believes that the views of women will be valuable in the court room, especially in certain criminal cases.

"Our jurisprudence seeks more and more to individualize punishment," he said. "Instead of fixing penalties according to the crimes, it tends to seek motives and to consider the mental state of the accused person. When it comes to the feelings of women, only women jurors can understand fully. As to male culprits, it would not be bad to break the masculine solidarity that excuses certain offenses."

Henri Robert, one of the most noted attorneys of Paris, supports the bill for mixed juries, but urges cautious application.
