World Court Reservations Analyzed

U. S. Senator from Illinois

Charles S. Deneen was born in Elmhurst, Ill., in 1863. He was graduated from McKendree college in 1882. Deneen was admitted to the bar in 1886 and practiced law in Chicago until 1904. He was a member of the Illinois house of representatives and served as state's attorney of Cook county (Chicago) Illinois. A Republican, Deneen was elected governor of Illinois for two terms, 1905-09 and 1909-13. He was appointed U. S. senator in 1925 to succeed the unexpired term of McMillin McCormick, deceased, and was elected to the same office in 1925. His home is in Chicago.

New Brunswick Bars Billboards

Advertising signs of all kinds will be prohibited on the highways New Brunswick, Canada, if a bill now in the Provincial Legislature is passed, as the Bureau of Provincial Information and Tourist Travel is convinced it will be.

The bureau also announces that the plan to increase the gasoline tax in the Province from 3 to 5 cents a gallon will not go into effect until Jan. 1, 1929, and that when it does become effective the motor vehicle license fee will be reduced, probably from \$1 to 80 cents per hundred pounds. For the rest of this year the gas tax will remain at 3 cents, while the Provinces on each side of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia to the east and Quebec to the west, impose a tax of 5 cents a gallon.
