Burglars Escape With Tools Valued At \$600; No Clues Left

Burglars, who broke the lock on a shanty used by workmen for storing tools in the rear of a home on Arlington drive being constructed by the Frank Couzens, Inc., of Birmingham and escaped with tools valued at \$600, are sought today by police.

The thieves made their haul between Friday night, when the laborers, stopped work, and Monday morning. The burglary was discovered when the work started. Eight men lost tools with values ranging from \$5 to \$300, police report.

State Asks Retrial On Road Awards

(Concluded from Page 1, Part 2) the street, which is in Oakland County. The south side of the street in Wayne County, Detroit, Attorney General Brucker's petition is accompanied by several affidavits. Paul A. Sargent, Detroit real estate dealer, stated many of the awards were excessive.

Jacob M. Shantz, a Detroit employee of the state highway department, states Catherine Johnson refused \$6,950 as a settlement for her land and demanded \$7,500 when approached with negotiations for a settlement. She was allowed \$15,262.50 by the condemnation jury.

Asked \$7,080; Got \$17,915. John F. Brenning of Detroit, another employee of the highway department, declared Luman F. Baldwin offered to sell his land for \$7,080 and keep a house valued at \$1,250. His offer was refused. The jury allowed him \$17,915.50. Andrew Stafani who was given the largest award of \$86,184 for a parcel of his land had offered to settle with the state previously for \$76,200.

Elmer C. Rice of Detroit stated in his affidavit that the award of the condemnation jury was fully \$200,000 in excess of what the property owners had any right to expect of the state.
