(Concluded from Page 1) and hand wares are sold at cost prices. The employment deal will be on this floor with rooms for the Boy Scouts and the Girl Scouts, each of which will have offices, lockers, kitchenettes and a consultation room.

The campaign goal is \$125,000. This will provide for the construction of the building, its equipment and maintenance for one year.

The auditorium of the House compares favorably with other auditoriums in the village. It is 10 feet longer and 5 feet wider than that of the Village Players theater. It is slightly smaller than the auditorium of the Cranbrook school but it will be without pillars. The site is practically the same as the floor for jangling by the Fox and Hounds Inn in Bloomfield Hills. It is almost half as large as the auditorium of the Baldwin High School, which is the largest in Birmingham and it is planned to seat three times as many persons as the auditorium of the Baldwin Library.

The architects are Muehlman & Farrar.
