

2 LAND TRACTS IN ELECTIONS

Annexation To Pontiac Decried; Republicans Win In Bloomfield

TOWNSHIP GETS PARK

Bloomfield gained two tracts of land by annexation as Bloomfield Township elected all Republican nominees and approved the purchase of the land for a park Monday at the annual elections. The township retained that portion of the township which the General Motors Truck company plant is located which was proposed by vote in the city of Pontiac. The vote in the affected territory defeated this annexation.

Sheffield Estates subdivision, a tract of 162 acres was annexed from Troy Township to Bloomfield by vote of 113 to 80. No votes were cast in the affected territory as it is not populated.

Pleasantview subdivision, 750 acres, was annexed from Troy to Bloomfield. This tract is approximately 750 acres.

The purchase of land by the township for use as a public park was approved by a vote of 274 to 21 and the only objection which opposed the purchase was that situated in the Bloomfield Hills.

The title of Pontiac and the township approved the annexation of the General Motors land by a vote of 274 to 21. The affected territory, whose vote was necessary for the annexation, voted against it by a vote of 113 to 80. This land and the buildings has a potential tax valuation of more than five million dollars.
