FRIENDLY INDIANS HOLD ANNUAL SALE

More than 20 of the Oneida tribe, Wolf clan, of the Friendly Indians, whose big chief is Frank C. Deer, manufactured and sold homes for Birmingham's feathered friends, to enrich the tribal coffers, presided over by the Wampum Bearer. The sale was held at Deer's Barber shop, on East Maple avenue, last Saturday.

Displayed in the window were, beside the birdhouses, various tribal honors, badges, and emblems, the totem-pole, and photographs of the council meetings of the tribe.

The Oneida tribe is the older of the two Birmingham groups of Friendly Indians. It meets weekly in the Methodist Church, and is sponsored by the church. It is a branch of the Young Men's Christian association. The other group, the Mohicans, meets at the Adams School. A solemn ritual is learned by all the tribesmen, and is undergone at each council gathering.

The friendly Indians take only boys under 10 years of age. They may, however, stay in the tribe until they have gone through all the offices, and have received the title of "big chief." Next year, according to Mr. Deer, the organization plans to take boys from the ages of 7 to 10.
