"Each Man's Wishes Make His Heaven"

A young woman complained to me the other day of her disappointment in not being able to make her mother happy.

"It was always my hope," she said, "to be able some day to give her the things she missed when we were alone in London. I wanted her to have the luxuries that other women have, many of which she sacrificed so that we might have other advantages."

"Now that my dream has come true, she could wear lustrous clothes and enjoy everything about town, she does not care for any of these things. It seems impossible for me to make her happy."

"When my husband and I want to take her out with us to the parks to stay at home. When we propose that she accompany us on an interesting trip she says she would not enjoy it. When we go with her to a summer hotel she says she wishes we would let her go to a farm."

"It is the disappointment of my life that now when I could give her everything her heart desires nothing seems to give her pleasure. It is a tragedy."

"The only thing about the situation that is tragic, little girl, is your unhappiness, brought about by your refusal to recognize what constitutes happiness for your mother. Yours is not an uncommon situation. It is the story of many children grown to husband and womanhood, successful, who would never in sheer giving to those who have given so much to them. They do not realize what a foreign saving has put so aptly—that 'Each man's wishes make his heaven.'"

We cannot be happy according to some one else's idea of happiness. What constitutes pleasure to some of us is boredom to others, and many things that we enjoy when we are young attract us no more at all when we have reached middle or old age.

There are some men and women, who, no matter how old they may be, retain a childlike pleasure in excitement and costly amusement, who enjoy spending money and seeing the sights. But most parents find contentment in seeing their children happy and successful, and prefer living quietly and in accordance with their old habits to following the pace their children would set for them.

Wise sons and daughters will recognize this and will not chafe at being "unable" to make her happy. The daughter who calls this the disappointment of her life should find ample consolation in the knowledge that her success and happiness make her contentment and joy for her mother, that her thoughtfulness and devotion in themselves constitute the realization of her mother's dream even though the older woman may not there to take advantage of the pleasures her daughter feels she should enjoy. Let daughter continue to manifest this thoughtfulness and devotion and she need never worry because her mother's requirements are less than she would like to supply.

Under The Hood

CLEANERS NEED CLEANING

There are certain types of air cleaners which employ an oil coated filtering unit that, unlike the centrifugal devices, requires periodic cleaning. If this dirt-absorbing element becomes clogged, the air entering the carburetor carries with it some carbon which has been carried on the average motorist does not have to contend with if he is willing to clean his car. A regular oil cleaner should be inspected every 5,000 miles or so and particularly those articles, a regular oil cleaner the summer months when the dust is thickest even on the finest roads.

NEAREST OMNIPOTENT

THESE DEFORMED SEATS

Unless this unit is in its original condition, the seat springs are almost certain to become deformed with the result that the deep cushioning in the seat springs is almost certain to become uncomfortable. It is easy to be casual about this feature but it also is uncomfortable.

NEW VALVES MAY HELP

Replacing an intake with the sort of suction to replace any warped or burr-ed exhaust valves is a thought that the car owners might well bear in mind the next time they contemplate taking the machine to the shop for a carbon and valve job. These valves are subjected to extremely high operating temperatures and, when in the latest cars they are made of better heat-resisting materials, in some of the older models they go to pieces rather quickly under the strain.

QUALITY THE QUESTION

Don't let quantity have too large a bearing upon the completion of the job. If the grease is even slightly discolored it should be removed and the cap repacked with fresh, pure lubricant.
