Another world's series divvy may be just around the corner for the New York Yankees, but to at least three members of the team there is a long and dusty road ahead before the old pennant is ticked away for them.

Two of these fighters are old campaigners—Pennock and Hoyt. A strain of a pennant battle is not new to them. To Pennock it is an old and even monotonous grind. He has helped pitch his team to success on four different occasions over a span of 14 years, and has been in the thick of the pennant fight on three or four other occasions when the flag eluded him and his teammates.
