**WHOS WHO AND TIMELY VIEWS**

Restricted Immigration Regarded As National Safeguard

(Harry E. Hull was born at Belvidere, N. Y., in 1857. He was educated in grammar and high schools at Cedar Rapids, Iowa. After for some years pursuing a business career, Hull was elected mayor of Williamsburg, Iowa, for one term, 1887 to 1889, and served as postmaster of the town from 1901 to 1914. He served later as representative in the 64th to 68th congress from the Second Iowa District. Hull has been commissioner general of immigration since 1925.)

The greatest need of any country is a high order of citizenship. That fact is beyond dispute. The citizens of any nation are factors which preside to what benefits that nation may hope to rise. On the other hand, any country in which high standards of citizenship are forsaken is sure to decline. History tells this story, in no uncertain language. Nations which were once foremost in the annals of world progress have fallen in ruin when their people allowed their national vigor to lapse.

Many years had passed before America began to realize that it was of utmost importance to preserve the fiber of her citizens, by adding to that fiber only such human stock as would strengthen it, rather than interpose it with weakening elements. When we realized that careless immigration supervision during past years had permitted too much human dross to seep into the melting pot of American civilization, we determined that from that time forward eternal vigilance should be our watchword.

The knowledge has come to our national mind that social and economic dangers lie in a tide of immigration which is not rigorously censored. The injustice has been a double one—to the native American and to the newcomer; and the congress has wisely limited the admission of aliens seeking opportunity and employment among us. Without such limitations, we should have been soon submerged in social decay and our employment ranks would have grown to distressing proportions, to say nothing of the economic waste and expense of contributing to the upkeep of many groups who were not yet ready to enter fully into our national life. Physical, mental, and moral defects have also been put under ban by the restriction of immigration laws, thus lessening our responsibility to society in general for the type of people and

the kind of citizens which cast the mold of our national life.

And thus we have begun to preserve the standards of American civilization by enacting immigration laws of exclusion, kindly in period, but disqualifying certain types of immigrants aliens who would, if admitted, become a lasting menace to many of the things which hold most dear.

**HUPP HANGS UP NEW RECORD**

July business, totaling 3,010 Century Sixes and Eights, the largest July in Hupp's history, marked the Hupp Motor Car corporation to close the first months period of 1928 with total shipment exceeding that of the entire year of 1927.

**PARKS IN STATE SHOW INCREASE**

Attendance At Recreational Centers In Michigan Gaining

Large increases in the number of state parks in Michigan and in the attendance this season is reported by the State Department of Conservation.  
 The state's park acreage last year increased 17,007 acres, making a total of 24,949 acres of land in such areas at the present time. This is an increase of 23,844 acres since 1927 when, with 20 state parks, the acreage was only 1,103.  
 In 1928 the state had 20 parks; today it has 64. In 1922 these parks had only five and one-half miles water frontage; today the state owns 52 1/2 miles of water frontage along which tourists may camp and in whose cooling waters bathers may disport themselves.  
 During the same period the attendance in these parks has increased from 220,000 to more than five million.  
 The above does not include the Hayden military reservation which comprises some 15,000 acres and is used as a state park, nor Mackinac Island with its 2,929 acres.  
 Nine of Michigan's state parks are within the confines of Oakland County. Only two of these, those at Highland, Roches-

ter and Ortonville, have been fully developed. The other six are being held in their natural state until sufficient funds are voted by the State Legislature to finance their improvement.  
 Practically all of the state parks within this country are gifts from Howard Bloomer and the Dodge estate of Detroit.

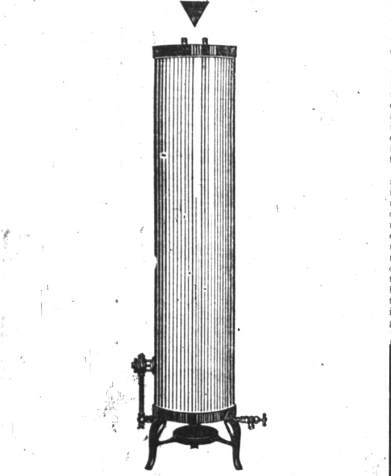
