Sheriff Schram was born in 1879 and spent his early life on a farm in Commerce Township. In 1898, he came to Pontiac and began work in the painting department of the old Pontiac Spring and Wagon Works and later worked for the Oakland Motor Car company.

In 1915, he became a member of the Pontiac Police department where he early showed his ability as an executive and as a fearless officer and was promoted to a captaincy. It was while thus employed that Sheriff James S. Butler persuaded him to become undersheriff, which position he filled so well and faithfully, that in 1924, when Sheriff Butler retired, there was such a demand on the part of law abiding citizens for Schram to become sheriff that he became a candidate and was elected from a big field of candidates by an over-whelming majority.

Sheriff Schram has organized as his staff, a group of competent and experienced deputies. He has demanded of his deputies these qualifications, honesty, sobriety, intelligence and courtesy, and he has no place in his employment for any man who can not measure up to these requirements. The result has been that the people of Oakland County have a profound respect for the office and no honest person has ever had cause to complain of its administration and no word of scandal has ever been spoken of Frank Schram either as to his public or private life.

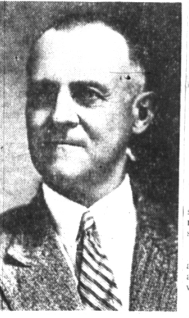

80 Acre Tract On Coolidge Highway Approved by Board

Approval for a new subdivision was made at the Troy Township board meeting last night. The plat accepted was 80 acres on Coolidge highway a short distance north of east Maple avenue and adjacent to Birmingham. It is being developed by the John Ward Howland realty company of Detroit. This new ground is approved as an addition to several other tracts owned by the same company in that section.

Last week a piece of property owned by the Birmingham Land company was approved by the township board. It is on the Adams road and borders on the Grand Trunk railway right of way. An addition, the fourth, to the Pembroke Mannot subdivision on east Maple road was also granted last week.
