DECISION SEEN ON FIRE PROPOSAL

Decision on the acceptance of a proposed fire protection contract from Birmingham is expected today following a meeting of the Troy Township board of supervisors.
The proposal made by the village commission was similar to those made for Bloomfield township and Bloomfield Hills Village. It contracts for a yearly payment of \$3,000 for five years in return for which Troy homes will have fire protection. Previously fire protection was offered the territory but a rate per poll was charged instead of the proposed basis.
Decision on the application for a franchise renewal by the Detroit United railway for its right of way along Main streets and Union road is expected to be reached soon.

G. T. WORK AT STANDSTILL

Work on the Grand Trunk grading east of here is practically at a standstill today following the denial of a writ of prohibition against Circuit Judge DeWitt H. Merriam of Wayne County by the state supreme court which allows the injunction issued by Judge Merriam to restrain the state from doing any work on the roadbed in certain sections.
The court, which convened Friday, indicated that the legality of the damage claims of the property holders in restricted areas would be settled the first week in September and desired to undertake the matter at the time. The state's appeal from the Oakland County circuit court necessitating the purchase of negative restrictive easements will be heard at that time.
Kit F. Clardy, attorney for the state entered a motion before Judge Merriam in Detroit, Tuesday morning, asking for the injunction to be withdrawn on the ground that the Wayne court has no jurisdiction on Oakland County property. The supreme court refused to consider the same contention because of lack of jurisdiction at present.

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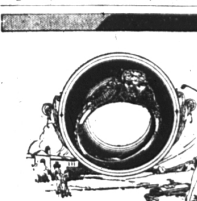


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
