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BIRMINGHAM'S 'WHO'S WHO'

Ralph Stone, Trust Company Executive, Tells Of Development Of The Business

Michigan is the only state in the union which does not permit its trust companies to do a general banking business, therefore, trust companies in Michigan are more strictly regulated than in other states.

Ralph Stone, of Cranbrook road, Detroit, is president of the Detroit Trust Company, and is one of the men who for many years has received mention in "Who's Who" believes that Stone's experience as officer of a trust company extends over approximately a third of a century.

Recently Mr. Stone has been invited to deliver an address upon trust departments and on the task of the legislator in connection with the establishment of the Pacific Trust Company in San Francisco in October.

The trust company law passed by the legislature in Michigan, Mr. Stone said, "was enacted in 1880. It came into being in response to the need for a general and business-like organization to administer estates and trusts of all kinds and to act as a general executor, administrator, and trustee. The complications of business have increased to an extent that it is now regarded as more of a profession than a simple trust company, that a commitment to put upon one's friend or even such relative as the executorship of one's estate."

New Profession

The work of the trust company is a business and partakes a great deal of the nature, also, of a profession. As it has grown and developed in this state, it calls for an organization with skill and energy in the handling of property of every conceivable kind, in connection with the business.
