CANDIDATE HITS LIQUOR PENALTY BOARD NAMES SCHOOL BOUND

Hazel Park Man Would Reduce Penalty For Prohibition Violation Russell C. Jones of Hazel Park, candidate for the Republican nomination of state representative in 1930, today attacked the liquor laws along a line of rigid economy.

"The reduction of prohibition penalties from a felony to a misdemeanor," he said, "is in favor of amending the law so as to eliminate the objectionable features of the liquor laws."

"To prevent the promiscuous selling of suit, claim deeds, and other property, the legislature should foreclose on land contracts."

"To favor the enactment of a new law on the subject of building contracts, the legislature should be compelled to furnish a suitable bond in connection with the license."

"For an increased compensation of the state auditor, the legislature should set the rate at \$20,000 per year, starting at the beginning of the fourth day of the month day as in the present time; that it should also include an occupational disease clause."

"The workmen should be compensated for diseases contracted in their employment, and all laws beneficial to labor should be amended to labor."

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PHYSICAL EDUCATION TEACHER DIES

Joseph Elizabeth Danday, 36 years old, of West Woodward road, Clarkton, died Tuesday afternoon at St. Joseph's hospital in Forest City, Tenn., following an illness of several months which forced her to resign her position in Southwestern High School last December.

She was born in Tennessee, and was educated in Bradford Academy, Tenn. She was a member of the Y. W. C. A. and the Baptist church.

Surviving her are a brother, Morris Danday, Stockton, Tenn., and a sister, Mrs. Mary Danday, also of Stockton, Tenn. Her father, Charles Pratt, of Chicago, and her mother, Mrs. John Pratt, of Toledo, Ohio, are also living.

JUDGE DENIES G. T. REQUEST

Following the refusal of Judge Glenn C. Gillespie in Pontiac circuit court to modify injunctions on the Grand Trunk right of way granted to George H. Johnston and Frederick P. Hubner, litigation restraining work on the new right of way was delayed.

The injunctions were acquired by property owners to protect residential property restrictions.

The trial court was the scene of a debate continuing almost the entire day, Monday, with arguments presented by the representatives of the state, the Grand Haven & Milwaukee railroad company and property owners.

That construction on the new grade of the Grand Trunk and Blount field townships might continue, state and railroad officials sought a modification of the court order prohibiting temporarily work along the right of way.

Blount in the progress of the railway construction which will allow the removal of the old Grand Trunk tracks from Woodward avenue and permit the completion of wider Woodward avenue, is not in violation of the injunction, according to Judge Gillespie. He states that the court sees but one point involved, that is, the right of the present property owners to compensation for the state's violation of their restrictive injunction.

Important maps and other matter in the review of the grant by the state supreme court were successfully introduced by Kit F. Clardy, assistant attorney-general.

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SCHOOL BOUND

All Adjustments To Be Made From Assigned School With the opening of Birmingham's schools scheduled for Sept. 4, the board of education has made public today the school district assignments for the coming year.

The districts have been bound as follows: The Adams building, through nine miles into the building, grades seven, eight and nine, west of Woodward and east of the district line, the entire district, Barnum building, kindergarten and grades one through five, inclusive, from west Maple to Bates street, and west Maple and west Southfield avenue, Maplecrest building, grades one through five, inclusive, from the street subdivision, Pierce building, kindergarten, grades one through five, inclusive, from Woodward avenue and south of Lincoln street, Hill building, kindergarten, grades one through five, inclusive, from the district line to the post-ward avenue north of west Maple and east of the district line, the River Rouge, west of Woodward avenue and west of north of the River Rouge and it, south of the district line or south of west Maple avenue.
