## Elegant Fabric Makes Sports Frock Formal

The sports type costume is still with us for fall and winter, but it is no longer the sports costume in the strict sense of the word. Costumes that a few seasons ago would have fitted into the sports category by reason of the materials used, as well as the type of garment, have now been promoted to the classification of formal wear owing to their interpretation in the so-called luxury fabrics, combination of colors and materials. The recent fall and winter style show of the garment retailers of America struck the formula note very definitely in all showings.

Interest was largely centered on fabrics. The transparent velvet note was subdued again and again in sports type, the formal afternoon frock, the evening frock, which may be taken as indication that transparent velvet will be quite the thing for early fall, if it does not go through the winter, which is more than likely. Many new printed velvets were shown in both small and large patterns, the large patterns for formal afternoon and evening wear, and the smaller prints for the sports type frocks. The ensemble theme was again stressed in both daytime and evening models.

The more formal afternoon frocks indicated a preference for flares, draped tunics, shirred fullness and pleats. The interpretation of the uneven hemline was more subtle, expressed in the daytime than in the evening dresses, but the irregularity of hemline was ubiquitous in all the models for the more formal wear. The uneven hemlines, there was no appreciable lengthening of the skirt, the length remaining at that established in the spring fashion show at about four inches below the knee.

Typical of the sports type gown was a two-piece model with beige or tan tunic patterned in a middle stellar design worn with a brown velvet flared skirt. The brown velvet was also used for yoke, belt and sleeve trimmings. Brown kid shoes of oxford type accompany the frock. You will find the frock costume sketched at the extreme right.

Typical of the ensemble gown for afternoon wear was a blue and gold printed velvet with seven-eighths coat. The frock had



the fullness placed at the front, where it terminated in a point forming the tunic. In one model, the skirt was black with a blue and gold print in the middle and continued in the skirt and black. Gray, white and black, in combination, was especially noticeable in a combination with black and dark blue. In the evening frock, the tunic and skirt were of a similar design, with a white and black print in the tunic and a black and white print in the skirt.
