STROKE KILLS AUTO DRIVER

Resident Of Halfway Steers Car Into Tree During Attack

Apoplexy is named today as the cause of the death of a man, about 35 years old, believed to be Leonard Roll, of Halfway, Mich., who died at the steering wheel of his car swerving into a ditch and his car while driving on the Ten Mile road, two blocks west of the John R. road. He was riding alone when his car swerved into a ditch and hit a tree.

Positive identification was made by Coroner D. C. Farmer, who was called to the scene, from paper in the man's pocket. He said apoplexy was the cause of death. The body was removed to Sullivan's Funeral Parlor in Royal Oak. No inquest is to be held.

GRAHAM-PAIGE ENLARGES PLANT

Detroit, Aug. 8.—Extensive additions to a total cost of \$1,500,000, have been begun by the Graham Paige Motors Corporation at its main plant in this city and at its body plant at Wayne, Mich., and Evansville, Ind. The new buildings and equipment, designed to increase production facilities from 400 cars to 600 a day, have been made necessary to meet the demand for the new line of cars introduced this year by the three Graham brothers, the last six months' sales having exceeded any previous entire year and doubled the 1927 total.

The construction program, either under way or about to begin, includes the following: Evansville, Ind.—Work on a new body plant to cost close to \$750,000 will begin at once. There will be ten building units each 30x270 feet. It is expected to have the plant ready for operation in November.

Detroit.—Two machine shop additions, each 50x80 feet; addition to receiving building, and construction of a second-story 60x884 feet; addition to engineering building. Total floor area, 129,000 square feet; cost, \$125,000. New machinery and equipment, \$200,000.

Wayne.—Addition to body plant, 100x110 feet, together with machinery and equipment to increase capacity to 200 bodies in nine hours; total cost, \$100,000.

Besides the new construction, the company has purchased a group of buildings here having a total floor area of 262,000 square feet, to which will be moved the service and export shipping departments.

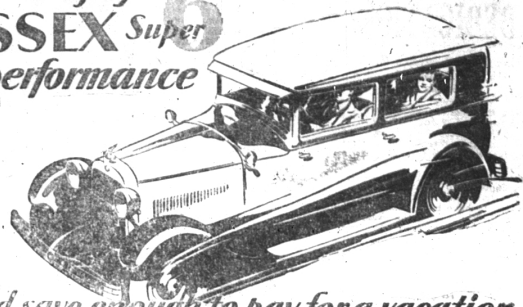

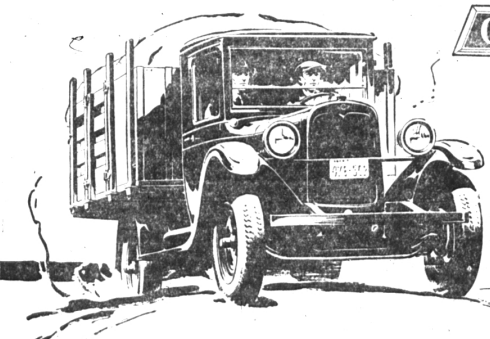
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
