

U. R. SEEKS NEW GRANT

Would Renew Franchise in Troy Township

An application for a renewal of the franchise through Troy township by the Detroit United Railway was considered last night at a meeting of the township board, but action was deferred until a later date.

The present franchise, which the suburban authorities seek to renew, will expire Dec. 30, 1928. The permit was issued 20 years ago and allowed tracks and trip equipment on Main street running north from Royal Oak through the township for six miles

and on the -tica road, east, one mile. definite steps in granting the new franchise has been taken by the board. Following a favorable decision the issue would be put to a vote of the people, according to Supervisor Morris Watters.

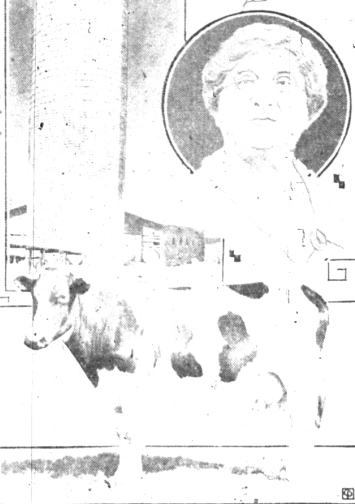
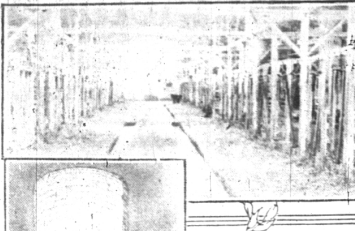

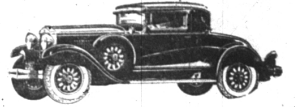
BIG BEAVER

The appearance of automobiles with wings in the near future is predicted by a manufacturer. In the past, the wings of wings have been extended almost entirely from the post-rotation class.

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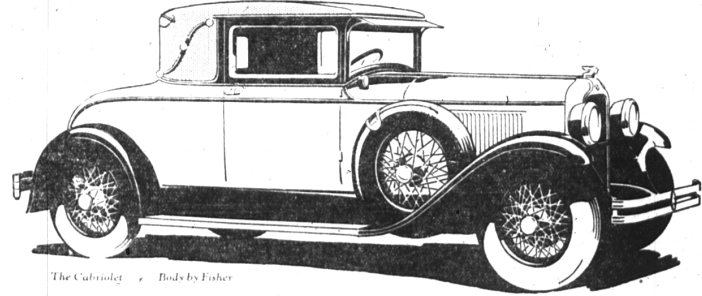
