A. A. U. W. Sends Book Sale Proceeds To Help Fellowship

Proceeds amounting to approximately \$200 from the book sale of the American Association of University Women will go to the American student abroad and the organization, it is announced today.

This action was taken by the association at their meeting yesterday afternoon at the home of Mrs. Loren G. Stauch, of west Maple road, when Dr. Catherine Chamberlain addressed the group on "Fellowships."

The Chamberlain was awarded a fellowship to Cambridge. She had submitted a paper on "X-ray and the award" was made on the condition that she finish her paper.

She told of the experiences of the American student abroad and of the advantages of these experiences.

In sketching these advantages, she told of broadened horizons for women, added tolerance in dealing with others, culture from contact with old world, and valuable contact with outstanding people.

"In taking an interest in this fellowship idea, we are making it possible for more women to avail themselves of opportunity to bring back a store of knowledge with which to help others," she said.

Christmas music, under the direction of Mrs. Helen Neff, was included on the afternoon's program. German, French, Bohemian and Russian airs were presented, as well as old English songs.

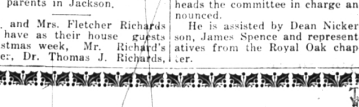
DEMOLOYS DANCE DATE SET AT DEC. 27
