Man Steps Into Woman's Shoe Fashion Field

The Christmas and Palm Beach seasons come so close together it would seem as though they clasped hands across the border line. No sooner have fashions for fall and winter been established, than along come the first harbingers of summer in styles for southern resort wear. No wonder southern has such a permanent influence on fashionable colors. Before last summer's coat is gone, we begin cultivating next summer's. So now we're thinking in terms of lightweight clothing, sunburn tones, and the high colors vying in sports' wear, while the snow is still on the grounds or yet to appear in northern climates.

Blue will be most important. To quote Margaret Hayden, Borkes, president of the Textile Color Card association, and the first and last word on colors: "I predict that the beige brown family, deviations of yellow, will be the outstanding thing." Next, blue, many shades of blue—not only dark, rich navy and brilliant blues, but the light tones of the sky, the soft atmospheric, grayish blues, will be ushered in. So in dress, beiges, browns, blues, and to complement them, your shoe should be beige, brown, or the dark blue leathers.

Men Choose Midnight Blues. Even the men are taking to the "midnight blues." Male fashionables at formal affairs are wearing midnight blue coats and waistcoats and blue kid shoes. The color is so dark it looks like black, yet eliminates the unpleasant deadness of black. Incidentally, men have taken a leaf from women's fashions, and are donning kid shoes for southern resort wear. They are becoming more and more ensemble conscious, and now see the incongruity of changing to straw hats and lightweight suits without changing from heavy to lightweight shoes. Of course, in the blacks and tans one cannot tell whether the shoes are of kid or not, except upon close examination, when the tiny pores which allow the feet to breathe are visible.

Cottons, silks and woadens are all to the fore again, in lighter weight than ever before. For southern resort wear in silks the stress is laid on the suit of satin, bengaline, faille, moire or taffeta with contrasting blouses. For example, with a black suit, the blouse may be yellow, grayed pink, beige with a greenish cast, or red. Often the jacket will be of a lighter color than the skirt, for there is a trend of light colors against dark. In prints, which will be very strong, the color trend in plain fabrics is followed, and the prints may be combined with the one-tone effects.

Low-placed Flare. Well worth watching is the trend toward the low-placed flare in the silhouette. All sorts and conditions of flares have had their day, and are now tending down to simpler lines. The princess silhouette is advancing from its rank as an extreme mode to one which is fast being accepted. Newest models in ensemble coats are slim and straight, with the flare in godets placed low in the front. Quite flat pleats have a broadening effect at the bottom, and there is the



evening silhouette of straight as the light-colored blouse over sheath effect to below the hips, the black skirt, or the skirt of dark blue of brown, as shown at the right of the sketch. At the top is shown a pair of white and brown kid shoes for men, and a pair of parchment kid sandals for women, both of which are predicted as popular in Palm Beach features.

How to Achieve Beauty



Every woman is born with an instinct for fastidiousness. It is this fact alone which is responsible for the thousand and one deodorant preparations now on the market. Perhaps the most interesting-compelling of the entire group are the antiseptic mouth washes which insure a sweet breath.

However, the sensible woman troubled with bitter-taste and the accompanying unpleasant breath, realizes that it is an internal condition which is causing her trouble which insures a sweet breath. You must remove the cause of intestinal putrefaction if your system is to be up to the mark. As a general rule, I think that an abstinence from the heavy cloying foods which simply refuse to pass through the system as they should, will go a long way toward establishing good health habits. The juice of a lemon squeezed into a glass of hot water taken every morning arising will help to start the day right. Milk of magnesia, one teaspoonful to a glass of water, or lemon and water, will relieve the acidity of your mouth and correct a common cause of unpleasant breath odors.

The frequent use of antiseptic mouth washes is another safety habit it will be worth your while to establish. Vigilance and antiseptic safeguards will relieve almost any difficulty temporarily. For permanent cure, however, I cannot too strongly urge that you look to your diet and the health of your system.

An acid condition of the mouth is a warning to look to your health habits. A good way to test for acid is to purchase strips of litmus paper, which are procurable at any drug store, and if the saliva of the mouth turns the blue litmus paper pink, then commence at once to eat plenty of lemons and oranges or employ other acid-coagulating habits.

Hard Sauce For the making of a hard sauce of velvet smoothness, use confectioners' sugar and butter. This may be in the proportion of one part of butter to two of sugar. If a semi-liquid sauce is desired, add a beaten egg to the hard sauce and flavor with vanilla.

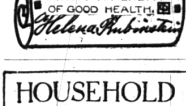

flame until tender. Sprinkle with flour and stir until it is mixed with the fat and juice in the pan. Add the stock and seasonings. Cook until thick. Add the meat and pour mixture into the center of the potato ring. Cover with buttered crumbs and bake until crumbers and potato are brown.

Chocolate Marshmallow Pudding—Two tablespoons quick cooking tapioca, one-fourth teaspoon salt, three tablespoons cocoa or one square chocolate, three-fourths tablespoon butter, two eggs, one teaspoon vanilla, one-third cup sugar, one pint scalded milk. Mix tapioca, salt, half sugar and cocoa. Add hot milk, stir and return to double boiler and cook until tapioca is tender, then add butter. Separate the eggs, beat the whites stiff, then the yolks slightly with the remainder of the sugar. Pour mixture slowly on the yolks and sugar, stirring constantly; return to double boiler and cook until thick. To the stiffly-beaten egg whites add a little of the hot tapioca mixture, folding it in carefully then add the remainder, add flavoring and cool. When cold add marshmallows cut in pieces. Serve very cold with cream if you wish.

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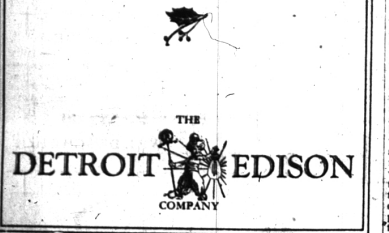
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
