INQUEST CALLED FOR SATURDAY

Evidence in Fatal Accident Here To Be Heard By Coroner's Jury

Inquest in the death of Walter Goosen, 50 years old, of 106 West Emmons street, is announced today by Coroner O. C. Farmer, for Saturday at 9:30 a. m. in the Court House.

Goosen died last week from injuries received when he was hit by an automobile driven by George F. Carter of Detroit, at Woodward avenue and Bird street. Carter was released after a statement of the prosecutor's office. The inquest set for last week was postponed because of his illness.

Carter claimed that Goosen stepped in front of his machine which he could not stop because of the wet pavement. The Birmingham man died while being rushed to the St. Joseph Mercy hospital.
