

PONTIAC HIGH GETS REVENGE FOR BEATING

Village Swamped By Home Quintet Set To Square Foot Ball Trimming

SCHWARZE SCORES HIGH

Friday night when the Pontiac High School cagers raced onto the floor they had a score to settle—and they did.
Practically all the first string basketball squad were football players. They all remembered the neat little defeat at the hands of the Baldwinites in football, 13-0, a few months ago.
The Chieftans avenged the defeat adequately; Birmingham was trounced 37-14 by the Pontiac High School gymnasium.
Orange Take Lead
The Orange-clad players got away to an early start and were

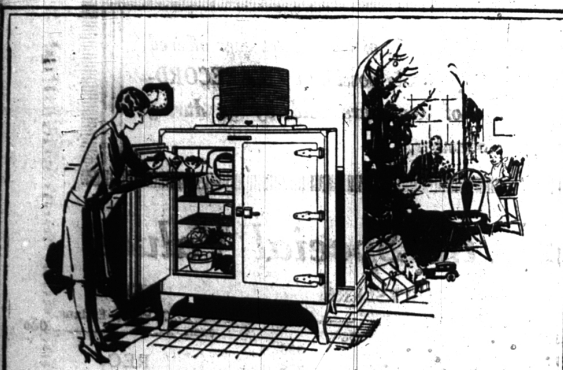
not seriously pressed at any time. The smooth passing attack and fairly dependable scoring attempts placed the home team in a 11-2 lead at the end of the first quarter.
Birmingham picked up, somewhat, in the second period but failed to overtake the well-timed additions of Coach Charles Weldon's players. The score at the half was 16-7.
Selle at center was the stellar light especially in the third quarter, before a substitute replaced him. He caged the ball five times in the last half on successive attempts. He was only credited with one miss in this half. Accurate passing from the guards to Oliver and Gallagher enabled him to slip the ball through the hoop. Selle was high scorer with seven field goals.
The score at the end of the third quarter stood at 22-11 and a peppy spirit by Pontiac early in the final stanza before the reserves were introduced eventually totaled the final score of 37-14.
Next to Selle, Gallagher counted for a great deal in the point column. Four field goals and four free throws out of six chances totaled 12 points.
Schwarze High Scorer
Herman Schwarze led the Birmingham scoring with 10 points, including four field goals and two free-throws. Birmingham did not look ragged but neither were they flabby. Pontiac was in possession of the ball most of the first half and had many chances at the hoop which failed.
Late in the fourth quarter Coach Ernest Engel followed suit and sent in his reserve material and the second string quintet fought it out with little action.

NEW DEVICE FOR SCHOOLS CONSIDERED

Clarence Vliet, superintendent of schools, and Melvin C. Hart, principal of the Baldwin high school, are authorized today by the board of education to investigate the public addressographs being used in schools.
The addressograph is a radio device which, by means of a connection with a speaker in every room in a building, will enable students to listen in on speeches or concerts without leaving their respective rooms, the board was told.
A main switchboard operates the addressograph, permitting the superintendent to lecture from his office to the entire school. It is also possible to "tune in" on radio programs and to transmit them throughout the building, it is claimed.
Mr. Vliet and Mr. Hart are to visit an addressograph plant in Sandusky, O., and report to the board of education.
An estimation gives the cost of the addressograph for a 10 room building as approximately \$1,000.
A novel experience was tried by the Senior girls of the Women's Education club at Ann Arbor last week in which Superintendent Clarence Vliet of the Birmingham school played a part. A senior girl was chosen to interview Mr. Vliet for a position as teacher. Mr. Vliet asked many questions, personal and general, showed the method of filling out the applications and told the girls how to approach a person when applying for a position.
