ANOTHER WORRY FOR GOVERNOR AL



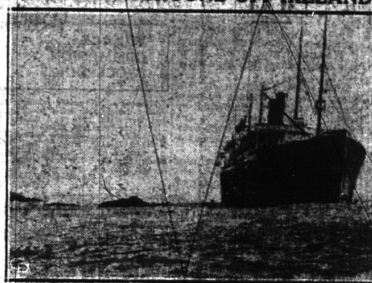

STEAMER AGROUND OFF IRELAND



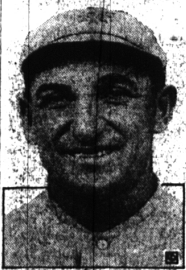

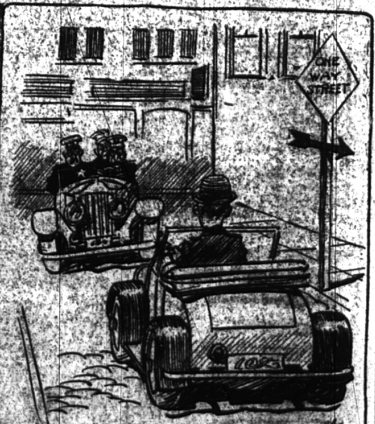
GEORGIA PEACH BACK FROM ORIENT
