CAGE SEASON OPENS DEC. 11

Large Squad Working Out Daily At Baldwin For St. Clair Tilt

A squad of 40 boys is now being put through daily training by Coach Ernest Engel at Baldwin High School in preparation for the season's debut against Lake Shore High School at St. Clair on Tuesday.

Twenty players were expected Tuesday to join the squad of 23 which has been practicing during the past two weeks. The smallest men who commenced practice this week comprise the larger part of the varsity squad.

The initial cut of the squad will probably be made the first of next week. It is expected by Coach Engel who plans to maintain a crew of 10 regulars and 10 second stringers with five extras to be worked in as needed.

A great deal of time in the preliminary practices with the varsity squad will be spent in finding forward possibilities, the coach said. "There is an abundance of guard material but not many forwards. The squad which has been practicing before the turnout on Tuesday has produced a few possibilities that may work into valuable material," he averred.

The game with Lake Shore, a class C school of a creditable record, is planned to feel out the strength and weaknesses to be considered before the Pontiac game, Dec. 14, at Pontiac High School.

The three veteran men now getting into shape for the cage game are Captain Floyd Doherty, Herman Schwarcz and Rodrick Cox. Other members of last year's regular squad who are back include Douglas Berger, Ralph Schwarcz, Hartwell Ladd and Thomas Ellerby. One of the likely candidates from the new material is Curtis Gibbs, a sophomore.
