58 MILES OF CONCRETE ADDED IN COUNTY DURING THIS YEAR

With the completion of this season's work in road building Oakland County has added more than 58 miles to its splendid system of concrete highways, according to a statement issued by Luther D. Allen, chairman of the Oakland County road commission. This makes a total of 705 miles of improved road in Oakland's county system, in addition there are several miles of state trunk line highway within Oakland's boundary.

Mr. Allen's statement continues: "The ever increasing road mileage in Oakland County has been brought about by several contributing causes: First, its proximity to Detroit; the growth of the major metropolitan area of Oakland County, with its 400 lakes, as a playground and recreation center; the growth and development of subdivision property in the southern part of the county and the organization of the road commission to take into account all these factors in planning and developing roads to meet required needs."

Important Projects

Among the important projects completed this year are the Lasher road, the West Rochester road, the continuation of the John R. and Bogie Lake roads; seven miles on the White Lake, and four miles of the Sherwood road.

In addition there have been several inter-county projects; the Dequindre street continuation which defines the Oakland-Macomb county line has been developed as far as the Fourteen Mile road. Then the Eight Mile or Bass Line, which is the boundary between Oakland and Wayne counties, is being developed as a super-highway on a 204 foot right of way, and is one of the major thoroughfares of the Master Plan for the metropolitan area. This project is being built by the State Highway department for the three counties, Oakland, Macomb and Wayne, on an assessment district basis.

The north end of the Telegraph road has been completed from its intersection with Square Lake road around the western limits of Pontiac, to join the Woodward Highway to the north. This with the Square Lake road, running over from Woodward south, forms an excellent by-pass for through motorists who do not wish to stop in Pontiac.

Descriptions Given

Detailed descriptions of some of the assessment districts roads built this year follow: White Lake road, A. D. No. 109; Length 7.10 miles; 20 foot concrete; grade 36 feet wide; ten inch edge, and eight inch center thickness. The White Lake road on the westerly limits of Pontiac west and north to the village of the Clarkson, connecting with the Dixie Highway at that point.

West Maple road—A. D. No. 114. Length 6.26 miles; 20 foot on 36 foot grade, standard construction; connects the Orchard Lake road with the Walled Lake road.

Thirteen Mile road—A. D. No. 117. Length 8.83 miles; standard width and thickness; extends from the Woodward superhighway westerly to the Orchard Lake road pavement.

McLollan road—A. D. No. 119. Length 5.11 miles; standard construction; extends from Dixie Highway to Drayton Plains, northwesterly to the Clarkson road, and connects with the south end of the Bushman road.

North Lasher road—A. D. No. 120. Length 5.55 miles. From the Twelve Mile, north to the Long Lake road.

Fourteen Mile

Fourteen Mile, East—A. D. No. 122. This is a short strip of little over a mile that connects the Woodward superhighway with the Southfield road. Construction follows established standard of 20 foot width and eight and ten inch thickness at center and edge, respectively.

Montclair Highway, A. D. No. 125, from Perry street in Pontiac, west to Baldwin avenue; 40 foot wide curb and gutter, 12 inch thickness at center and edge, 12 inch curb.

West Rochester road, A. D. No. 124. Length 5.52 miles; extends from the White Lake road.

South Lasher road, A. D. No. 130. Four miles, extending from the Eight Mile to the Twelve Mile road.

Maple road east, A. D. No. 131. One mile; completes the pavement from the John R. road to the Macomb-Oakland county line.

Fourteen Mile road east, A. D. No. 105. Length 5.95 miles; extends through the village of Clawson.

The Fourteen Mile road extends easterly from the Woodward superhighway to the Oakland-Macomb county line.

John R. road, A. D. No. 98. 7.5 miles from the Big Bear road, north to the State Park near Rochester.

Philippines Declared To Be Prospering

Chief of the Bureau of Insular Affairs

(Frank McIntyre was born at Montgomery, Ala., Jan. 5, 1865. He is a graduate of the University of Alabama, the United States Military Academy, and the United States Infantry and Cavalry schools. He was promoted through the grades from second lieutenant to major general, in 1917. Chief of the Bureau of Insular Affairs since 1912, he has been affiliated with the bureau since 1905. He took part in the Spanish-American war and was assistant chief of staff during the World war. He has been awarded the distinguished service medal and decorations from several foreign countries. His home is in Washington, D. C.)

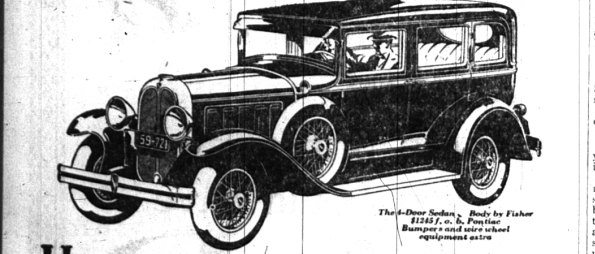

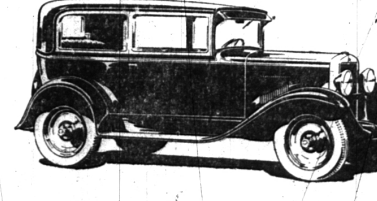
