

# MEAT FRAUD CHARGED TO 3

**Suspects, Under Heavy Bond, To Appear Today Before Buck**

Charged with conspiracy in an attempt to cheat and defraud the Parkery, Webb packing company of Detroit, one man is in jail and another was to be examined in the justice court of Floyd S. Buck today.

A third, Soll Ston of Detroit, is also named in the conspiracy charge by the complaining witness, John M. Walker of the packing company. A warrant for his arrest is in the hands of the police who are seeking him.

Evidence against Justice Dicken will be heard by Judge Buck. Walter Russell, who is in jail on default of a \$15,000 bond, waived examination Tuesday afternoon, when he entered a plea of guilty and was bound over to circuit court. His arraignment in circuit court will be within a few days, it is expected. He is in jail since his appearance in justice

court, Saturday, when he failed to raise his bail and was held for examination. Dicken was freed on a bond for \$15,000 secured through the American Employers Insurance company.

The three are charged with combining in establishing a meat market on east Pike street in Pontiac. They purchased \$205 worth of meat from the meat company, it is alleged. They are believed by the prosecutors to have paid for the merchandise with a bad check and sold the meat at less than wholesale price in two days of business Nov. 23 and 27.  ber report with a total of \$46,550. Although the figures designated in the applications for building permits have taken a rise the number of constructions have not increased in proportion. The total in October was 18.

Twelve new residences comprise the larger portion of the November sum. The cost is set at \$236,500. In the preceding month only three residences were not increased. The expense was approximately at \$30,550. Permits on four public garages costing \$76,500 were issued. Three private garages costing \$1,150 and three additions and alterations totaling \$3,000 finished the list of 23 new buildings and three additions and alterations. Twelve new buildings were recorded in October, private garages leading in number with eight.
