LATE SPURT DEFEATS 'S'

Baldwin Loses to Groose Pointe in Close Battle in Fast Played Tilt

Groose Pointe kept its state clean in the Southeastern League by winning its fifth consecutive match from Birmingham, Friday night, in the Baldwin High School gymnasium.

The rangy blue-eyed quarter found it hard to move to win the tilt, but managed to survive a third and fourth quarter spurt by the Baldwinites and add a few points before the final gun sounded, to win, 22-17.

Brilliant passing and accurate basket shooting enabled the Groose Pointe players to come out on top, getting off to a poor start in the first half, with the visitors leading, the Baldwinites exhibited a remarkable comeback in the third quarter. 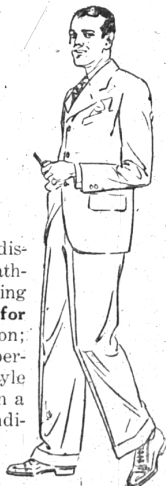

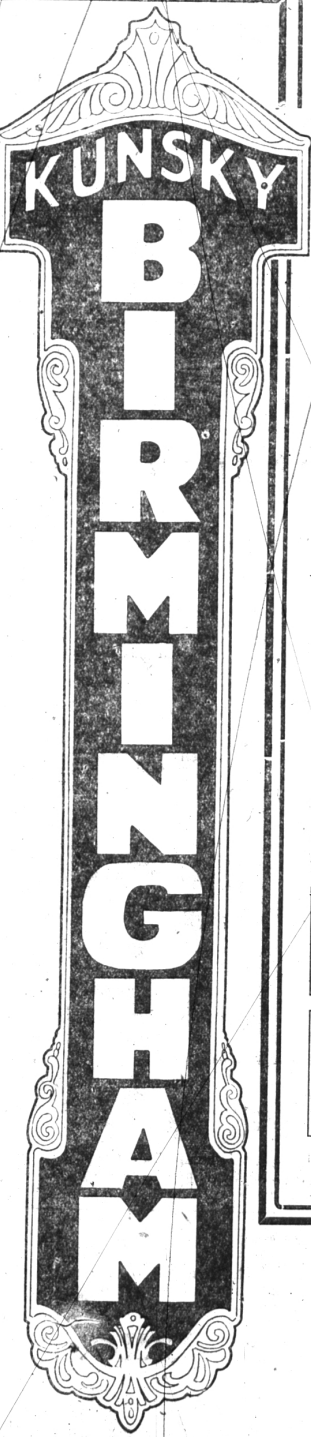
dren and have done a lot of it in the Flint Public Library where I am connected with the children's room," the new assistant continued.
