Village Group To Give Guidance Work For High School Girls

Vocational guidance will be offered high school pupils by the Birmingham American association of University Women as a result of the talk of Dr. May Hall James at the Fox and Hounds Inn Saturday at a luncheon honoring the senior high school girls of Baldwin, it is announced today.

Dr. James, former Birmingham A. A. U. W. member, spoke of the various types of activities for women and enumerated the colleges that give training for the various activities. She spoke at length on the need of vocational guidance, especially for high school students.

As a suggestion, Dr. James said vocational guidance could be made a part of the program of A. A. U. W. This challenge she appealed to the members of the association that today a committee with Mrs. H. J. Stringham of Oakland avenue as the head is in full operation.

ETCHINGS GIVEN COMMENDATION

Mrs. Curtis-Stanford, Village Woman Has Two Works in Michigan Artists Exhibit

Art critics are praising the etchings of Mrs. Eric Curtis-Stanford of Oakland avenue which were exhibited at the Michigan artists display at the Detroit Institute of Arts during January.

One of the etchings, called "The Approach" is an exquisite little piece depicting a scene in France. The other etching "The Bakehouse Close" laid in old Edinburgh, seeks to picture a Scotch courtyard of ancient times.

According to Mrs. Stanford many of the etchings of present time are of inferior cast simply because too many prints are made from one plate.

The word etching, she explains is derived from the Dutch word etzar, to bite and an etching is made by drawing a steel point over a copper plate covered with acid resisting wax.

The plate is then plunged into a bath of acid and after the lines have bitten into the metal to the required depth the wax is cleaned and a print made.

Although many prints can be made from one plate, Mrs. Stanford says, artists as a rule limit the number. The smaller the edition the greater the value of the print.
