## DECEASED SOUTHFIELD WOMAN WAS FIRST WAR VICTIM'S MOTHER

The death last week of Mrs. Harris J. Johnson, a native of Southfield Township, who died at the age of 76, recalls that she was the mother of the first Oakland County man to die in the world war. Her youngest son, John E. Johnson, died after an attack of influenza at Camp Custer in April, 1918.

Mrs. Johnson was the mother of 11 children. There are eight of the eleven living. She is survived by her husband, Jerome M. Johnson. Twenty-one grand children and four sisters and three brothers also survive.

Her name is linked with the history of Oakland County and members of her family are well known in many communities of the county.

Nine days before the death of Mrs. Johnson, her children and grandchildren celebrated her 50th wedding anniversary in the old homestead in Southfield Township. She had lived in the same home all the 50 years of her married life.

Mrs. Johnson was the daughter of Allen P. and Rebecca C. Wright. She was born Dec. 16, 1851, and on Jan. 19, 1878, was married to J. M. Johnson.

Wright, Pontiac.
