## MANY GROUPS TO GO OVER PLANS OF COM. HOUSE

### Series Of House Gatherings Being Planned By Board Members

That as many people in the village as possible may know the details of the Community House drive set for May 1, small groups under the tutelage of the Community House Board will meet during March at various homes in the village.

There will be at least 30 of these groups meeting during the month and they will be called club-cooperative and church-cooperative groups. The church groups will be named by two representatives from each church, the club groups by two members chosen from the clubs and various other organizations in the village.

Although these gatherings will be social affairs, they are limited to no more than 10 or 12 people, most vitally interested in civic matters, and especially in promoting the drive for the new community house, the time will be spent in discussing the different features of the house and in giving out such information as will be clear in the minds of the people gathered by the Community House sponsors. It is hoped, at least 450 people will participate in these gatherings.

Reports of the talk recently given at the Detroit Masonic Temple by Miss Maud Royden, wife of the late admiral, at a meeting of the Oakland County branch of the Women's International League for Peace and Democracy, Mrs. Clarence Galt, of Maple avenue; Mrs. George Hendrie of Brown street; Mrs. W. C. Bates street, told about the lecture, which was given before a packed house.

Miss Royden, who is a great peace worker, stressed that attitude of Great Britain on the question, Mrs. Hadjisky said. "She reminded us of the great naval tradition that is ingrained in the sentiment that is so strongly tied up with the British fleet. She is certain, however, that the British are gradually overcoming their sentiment, and coming to realize the wisdom of their work."
