This first real attempt to separate the practice of medicine from pharmacy was at Edinburgh, Scotland, in 1750, when the Edinburgh College passed resolutions divorcing these two sciences. In 1804 in Massachusetts, the medical association of that state produced the first book covering pharmacy, which has been revised and brought up to date every ten years. This book treats on the discovery and therapeutic value of all medicines.

"At first these of medicine was a trial for those who consumed them, because in those days medicines were given in all their crude extraction, which means that, to the sense of taste, they were often hard to swallow," said Mr. Shain. "However, in 1800, sugar-coated and gelatin-covered pills and medicines were introduced to take the place of the rasher ones."

Michigan, in 1881, passed legislation requiring all persons working as pharmacists to obtain licenses, granted after examinations. Requirements for becoming a pharmacist are two years of apprenticeship and two years of accredited college of pharmacy, he said.

Walter L. Connelly, local building contractor, was the last to give a short resume of his career. He was born in Saginaw, Michigan, in 1888, and attended school there. He graduated from the University of Michigan in 1911 as a Bachelor of Civil Engineering. He spent a number of years as an appraiser and construction engineer for the Saginaw, Bay City railroad, and was also employed by Smith, Hinckman & Grills, Detroit and Ann Arbor engineering firm. With Dean Gooley, he helped to appraise the Detroit United Railway properties several years ago.

During the recent World War Mr. Connelly was overseas, and returned to Michigan in 1919 forming a partnership with John B. Williams, as developers of Birmingham Estates, then a new subdivision. A year ago Mr. Connelly formed the corporation now bearing his name, and is actively engaged in building in this community. Altogether, he has constructed about 45 residences in Birmingham and vicinity. He was married last Summer and lives on East Maple avenue.

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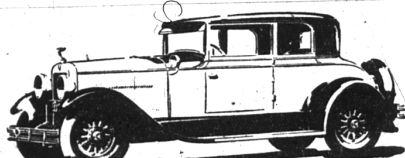
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
