

LAST SKI MEET OCCURS FEB. 26

Detroit Club Will Close Season With Tournament Near Rochester

Announcement is made today of what will probably be the last tournament this season of the Detroit Ski club, to take place at 3 p. m. Sunday at the club grounds, one mile east of Rochester.

Fifteen or more jumpers from the Detroit district are expected to take part. Additional interest is assured by the presence of Henry Hall, world's champion distance jumper, who recently returned from Revelstoke, B. C. where he set a new mark of 232 ft. An effort is also being made to enter Lars Haugen, national champion, who is now on a tour of the east, but will be returning to his home in Minneapolis at that date.

Lack of snow on the ground is no indication of conditions at the hill, Elmer C. Adams, secretary of the club explains. "These meets are prepared for weeks in advance. Whenever snow falls, it is piled up and kept in storage, so that a tournament can be held at almost any time except when rain is falling. Mild weather does not hinder the jumpers, and is all the better for spectators," he said.

At present there is an abundance of snow on the ski club grounds, and the landing hill is covered with a coat which will aid for the interstate tournament, Feb. 12. There will be free admission on the club grounds and Bloomer state park. Admission will be at a nominal rate for adults, children to be ad-free.

ATTORNEY IRONS OUT BALLOTING PROBLEM

Because the village of Birmingham is situated in Bloomfield and Troy townships, and because the village registration roll is adjudged the only one necessary to identify electors who are entitled to vote on all annexation propositions affecting Birmingham, people not registered on the township roll will be eligible to vote in the future; this was the gist of a statement made to the village commission Monday night by Clare H. Ogden, village attorney, who has been conferring with Burton P. Daugherty, county clerk, on the subject.

Past practice has held that only citizens registered on the township books were eligible to vote at any election held by the township, which is the case with annexation propositions. The investigations now being made by Mr. Ogden are the results of efforts on the part of Lee A. White, village commissioner, to make it possible for all local citizens registered on the village roll to vote. About a year ago, at an annexation election, a number of Birmingham voters were refused ballots on the grounds that they were not registered on the township roll.

Mr. Ogden expects to have the matter settled so that eligible local voters, even though not registered on the township roll, may vote, even though they have to swear in their vote on election day.

SEWER ASSESSMENT ROLLS CONFIRMED

Confirmation of two village assessment rolls for storm sewers was made by the village commission Monday night. One of them, on Henrietta street from Frank street to Lincoln avenue, costing \$5,154.00, will bear an assessment of 47 per cent against the abutting property and 53 per cent against the village. The extra cost over one-sixth for the village is because it is a trunk line.

Storm sewers on Holland, Cole, and Webster avenues will cost \$14,997.00, of which 23 per cent will be paid for the village, and 77 per cent by the abutting property.
