### NEED IS CITED FOR PARKWAY

Viet Advocates More Recreation Grounds In Birmingham

Birmingham today should plan on its recreation facilities for the future, members of the Young Men's service club were told at their luncheon yesterday noon at the Chateau Tea Room by Clarence Viet, superintendent of schools.

The rapid growth of Birmingham necessitates organized planning for its future needs in this regard he made, he said. He suggested a park along the River Rouge that would have tennis courts, baseball fields and a swimming pool.

"Birmingham is growing rapidly and it must make plans for the future," he said. "The population of the village will need recreation and this is the time, while property may be obtained reasonably, to start the work."

Mr. Viet also said he saw the need for schools to provide indoor golf rooms where students would be able to learn the fundamentals of the game. "This is the only sport students take with them into after life," he pointed out.

### WOODWARD LIGHTS AGAIN TALK TOPIC

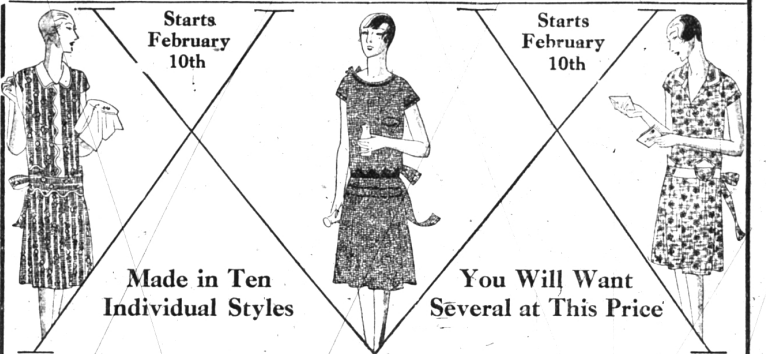
The much talked-of traffic lights on Woodward avenue were subject for discussion again Monday night at the commission meeting.

### YELLOW COACH CREW ARRIVES

Advance Guard of Township Plant Here This Week Operation To Start Soon

Under the present schedule it is believed that the whole plant will be under full production by April 15, or May 1 at the latest.

About half of the service department are married men and will bring their families here. For the present, however, Mr. Ruthenburg said, the majority of the men will leave their families temporarily in Chicago.

There are about 50 men in the service department, including executive and office employees, and the remainder of the group will arrive in Pontiac about Feb. 15.

The movement of our men will be slow, Mr. Ruthenburg said, as it is necessary for us to keep the service department in operation. The Chicago unit will continue to function until the first of the organization is set up and ready for business in Pontiac.

Following the service department the Hertz Driveway Sales Corporation will be moved to Pontiac, and there will also be a gradual movement of executives, office employees and syndicate managers of this branch, under the same plan used by the service department.

The accounting department and purchasing department will follow next and after these departments are in operation in Pontiac, movement of the general production units will start on or about March 15.

### ACTIVITIES OF Y. M. C. A. HERE INCREASING, REPORT INDICATES

Annual report of the activities of the Y. M. C. A. of southern Oakland County under the direction of Robert D. Lynd, made public today, shows a steady increase.

More than 1,000 boys assemble at the Hi-Y conferences, six of which were held last year. The first summer camp was held in 1921 and the attendance increased to 300 last summer. A larger number is expected during next summer.

Practically every school in the county has a track team and in 1921 there was none. More than 700 players have participated in the Church Twilight baseball league and eight teams are playing in the church basketball league while 75 are engaged in volleyball.

During 1927 more than 5,000 persons participated in father and son observance, the report indicates. Other items on the report include:

Institutes for training volunteer leaders of boys' groups have been held regularly each winter.

Three clubs of Junior high school boys are meeting regularly and two others are in the process of organization.

Twelve junior boys clubs meet once a week and participate in a character building program under the direction of an adult volunteer leader.

Eighty-one men in the various committees give generously of time in counsel on the various committees.
