## GIRL SCOUTS GIVE EXHIBIT

### First Public Demonstration To Be Held At Adams School Tomorrow

Girl Scouts here are ready for their first public demonstration, to be held in the auditorium of the Adams Junior High School at 7:30 p. m. tomorrow.

To show in what manner the Girl Scout meetings are conducted, the demonstration will be held as a troop meeting, with each troop representing itself as a patrol in the troop. Opening and closing ceremonies, drill formations, and all will be held just as a regular meeting, with each patrol that each "patrol" is putting on a Scout stunt for this meeting.

Scout Elizabeth White, of Troop 2, will sing at the entrance of the six troops in mass formation. After the program, the girls will sing "Taps," followed by "Taps" on the bugle played by Scout White.

All of the troops have evolved plans for the program. One troop is to give an exhibition of the different methods of artificial respiration and their uses. Another will show how knot-tying is taught by games. Troops 3 and 4, which are temporarily consolidated, will give a humorous and melodramatic skit embodying many of the details of the work found in the first, second, and first-class terms.

Girl Scouting in Birmingham has developed rapidly and is shown. Although a troop was organized some years ago under Mrs. Mary Farrar, now a high school grade teacher in the Adams School, it was not until last May that the school started a first class troop. Now there are six troops, with a total membership of approximately 176 girls. There are three executive members, and council members are active at present.

### Baldwinites Smother River Rouge Tracksters In Meet That Reveals Stars
