## LAST MINUTE SPURT WINS FOR BALDWIN

**Cagers Defeat Ypsilanti By 18-16 Score In Fast Game**

**PLAY MONROE FRIDAY**

A spurt in the fourth quarter staged by the Baldwin cagers enabled Birmingham to defeat the Ypsilanti basketball quintet in a closely contested match played in the latter's gymnasium last Friday night. The final count was 18-16.

Tomorrow the villagers meet the Monroe team at Monroe. This is the first E. A. League game of the season. The varsity game will start at eight p. m. Neither team in the Ypsilanti game was able to establish a large margin. A great many attempts at the cage by both sides failed throughout the encounter. Birmingham led the score at the end of the first period by a tally of 4-2 but Ypsilanti team rallied in the second quarter to place the score at 10-8 in its favor at the half ended. In the third period the Yps players lost their margin when Birmingham rallied and tied the points at 13-13 at the quarter ended. In the final quarter the Maroon players were able to gain the lead late in the period and keep the home aggregation from approaching their basket, although several throws narrowly missed scoring.

Zoderick Cox, Birmingham center was the high scorer of the scrapping four field goals to his credit. Herman Schwarze, guard, displayed excellent work and was responsible for two toasts each made on long angle shots. Captain Thomson and Rodger Brown both aided in the scoring with a marker a piece and Floyd Doherty tallied one point on a free throw.

For Ypsilanti, twinner, Captain Patterson, guard and Dignan, forward, stood out in the recording of points, each had five. Alward, forward, Webb, center and Max, guard, registered one field goal to complete the scoring. Schwarze opened the scoring soon after the game began by leaping from behind the foul line. Cox added another goal and Al-

ward of Ypsil scored on a short shot. In the second quarter Ypsilanti kept up one during the eight minutes of play scored four baskets. Dignan was responsible for two on shots from behind the foul line and Webb and Max each succeeding on an attempt from the foul line. Meanwhile, Thomson and Cox both added a goal, one on a shot from close up and the other from behind the foul line. Ypsilanti in this half found chances to pelt the Birmingham backboard 26 times while Birmingham threw at the local cage 25 times.

In the third period Birmingham had the edge by chalking up two goals and one point on a free throw. Cox, Brown and Schwarze, respectively were responsible for these points which tied the score. Dignan succeeded on a free throw and Patterson accounted for a basket to raise the Yps total. Cox gave Birmingham the lead by scoring a short shot soon after the fourth period opened. Patterson cut down the margin with one point on a free throw and later scored on a long shot to end Yps's scoring. Doherty tallied a point on a foul and Schwarze again succeeded on a long heave to give the Maroons the victory.

## DEBATERS MEET PT. HURON TODAY

**Baldwin High Students To Travel To City For Contest**

The Birmingham debating team meets the Port Huron team today at 1:30 p. m. at Port Huron. The team is composed of Norman Martin, LeLand Gunn and Mildred Patterson.

This far Baldwin High School has won a unanimous decision from Mr. Clemens and lost a two-to-one decision to Ferrandis. They held a practice debate with Central high school of Detroit Monday.

On this same date, January 12, 240 high schools of the State, all members of the Michigan High School Debating League, will meet at the Michigan State Normal School at Ypsilanti. The Direct Primary System of Nominating Candidates for Public Office in the United States should be abolished. This debate, on January 13 will be the third of the four Preliminary Debates sponsored by the Michigan High School Debating League. The remaining Preliminary Debate will be held on January 27, 1928.

After the 240 high schools have participated in this final Preliminary Debate, the schools with the highest records will enter the Elimination Series of debates which will, by successive debates, eliminate all schools except two which will come to Ann Arbor for the final State Championship Debate in April.

Reports received from the first 240 Preliminary Debates, held on November 18 and December 9, indicate an almost even break between "affirmative" and "negative" victories throughout the State. The reports also indicate a greater interest in debating than ever before as the first 240 Preliminary Debates were attended by more than 50,000 people of the State.

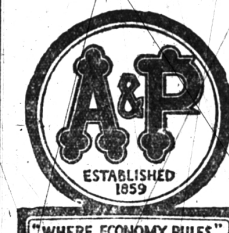
