VARIETY MARKS PROGRAM OF THURSDAY MUSICAL MEET

A program which comprised several phases of modern music was given last Thursday morning at the meeting of the Thursday Musicales of Birmingham in the auditorium of the Baldwin Public Library. It included a description of "The King's Henchman," by Mrs. Arthur Neff, three piano numbers by Mrs. Donald Stanton and two groups of songs by Mrs. George Drexley.

Mrs. Drexley's first group was in French and Spanish—"Maudite Piano," by E. L. Huiler, Bercuse, by Ripart, and "La Opa," by Ripart. Her second group were English songs, charming and fanciful in their style and the manner in which they were sung, "Six Little Eskimos," by Harvey Worthington, "Loomis," by Hindu Children's Train Song, by Albert Mallinson, and "Rebecca," a Cautionary Tale, by Liza Lehman and Hilare Belle, were the three songs in the group and three short encores by John and Rue Carpenter followed.

Mrs. Stanton played three of MacDowell's compositions, "To the Sea," "Improvisation," and "A Scotch Poem," giving to each one its own MacDowell significance and melody.

Mrs. Neff began her review of "The King's Henchman" with some information about Deems Taylor, who wrote the music for this, the first successful American opera, and about Edna St. Vincent Millay, who wrote the libretto. She read some of the more beautiful and moving lines from the poem and sang a brief melody which recurred during the action of the opera. The music was characterized as extremely modern in style, the whole effect greatly dignified and enhanced by the beauty of the lines.

Mrs. Neff announced that the chorus, which she is directing, will meet next Wednesday morning at the library auditorium to begin rehearsals for a spring appearance.
