An instance of the progress made is given by Miss Christensen who said the examiners average about one school room a day. So far their activities have been confined to the Adams school.

Several persons have attributed the decrease in the number of contagious diseases in Birmingham among school children to the examinations. The report for December, made public today by Dr. Newitt, shows only six cases of chicken pox, one of scarlet fever and one of measles were reported.
