## PLANS MADE FOR SPEAKER

International League Sponsors Appearance of Miss A. Maude Royden

Mrs. George T. Hendrie, Bloomfield Hills, is chairman of the committee on arrangements for the appearance of Miss A. Maude Royden, famous woman preacher of London, England, in the Masonic Temple auditorium, Detroit, Feb. 10. Miss Royden's lectures will be sponsored by the Women's International League, of which Mrs. Hendrie is the chairman.

Mrs. A. S. Duack, 327 Willett streets, is in charge of the sale of tickets in Birmingham. "As chairman of the Michigan branch of the league, I am very happy to be able to announce definitely that we are to have the honor of presenting Miss Royden," said Mrs. Hendrie. "As soon as we knew of Miss Royden's visit to this country the Michigan branch attempted to secure her for a lecture but another organization had previously asked for her and it was an exclusive engagement. Because of her great contribution, not only through her writings but through her life, to better understanding between races, classes, peoples of different religious faiths and nations, she is today one of the most influential women of the present age."

"The organization is unique in that it was formed during the war as an international organization whose purpose was to bring peace to the nations of the world, and was able to continue its work during the war period—sustaining a practical illustration of what peace in the hearts of women can accomplish. International conferences are held every two years and national conventions are held

each year in the various countries. "As great interest is being expressed in the aims of the Women's International League at this time, this statement of aims is appropriate. It aims at uniting women of all countries who are opposed to every kind of war, exploitation and oppression, and who work for universal disarmament and for the solution of conflicts, by the recognition of human solidarity, by conciliation and arbitration, by world co-operation, and by the establishment of social, political and economic justice for all, without distinction of sex, race, class or creed."
