PASTOR SPEAKS ON POSSIBILITIES
"It lies within the power of every one to have a name which is a name indeed," said the Rev. D. L. Woodward speaking Sunday night on "What Is Your Name?"

Mr. Woodward said in part: "The name you now wear may not mean much of anything as yet. At first it is an unknown quantity like X, Y, or Z in Algebra. In the course of a few years you may pack it full of content so that it may have a certain distinction of its own."

"It is not what you are now that matters you up or down on God's books. It is what you want to be and by the grace of God you can be. Here then, tell me your name—the name you bear now and the name which you mean to wear—and I shall know the most important thing in all your life."

"Religion deals with men just as it finds them but recognizes them as potential factors in the building of the Kingdom of God. It draws out the best in them. The ideally you cherish, the purposes you hold, the capacity you feel for something finer than anything as yet attained—these are contained in the new name which you are privileged to wear if you choose to do so."
