COME-BACK TRY FAILS

Holding a margin gained in the first quarter, throughout the contest, Royal Oak downed the Baldwin team in the second game played by these teams this season last Friday night in the Baldwin gymnasium. In winning the Aacorns repeated their victory in a fast court game.

TWO STIFF GAMES FACE BALDWIN FIVE

Coach George Johnson's crew encounter some stiff work to-morrow and Saturday. Friday the Maroons meet Rochester at 8 p. m. in the high school gymnasium. The following night the team travels to Port Huron. Practice for these two contests ends this afternoon. Rochester is not expected to offer a hard battle as the Port Huron aggregation.

The Baldwinites cut down the points Royal Oak established in winning minutes but at no time gained the lead.

McDowall, and Captain Hallock, Aacorn forwards, were the stars and high scorers. McDowall was the game's high point man with a total of nine on three field goals and three free throws. Hallock was next with eight points he attained by making three field goals and two foul points.

For Birmingham, H. Schwarze, forward, was the principle point-maker with three markers to his credit. Captain Thomson, forward, was next having accumulated four points on free throws before he was taken out in the latter part of the game on four personal fouls.

All Long Shots

Very few chances were open to either team for pot shots from men at the basket, although the Aacorns were responsible for three. Only two of the villagers' points were made on the basket, most of the throws which gained points were from midfloor. In general Birmingham's play was rugged and the passing game which usually is worked with some success was almost forsaken against the Royal Oak defense.

Following the opening of the contest and after Birmingham had failed to score on a play from tipoff, Tomkins, visiting guard, and H. Schwarze both failed in free throws and shortly afterward McDowall started Royal Oak's point making by looping the hoop after a foul against him. Cox, Birmingham center, was afforded chances to even this up on free throws but failed to make good.

McDowall heaved a long shot which cleared the cage after this. Both Ladd, Maroon guard, and H. Schwarze failed on tosses from the foul line after fouls had been committed against them. Schwarze however, found the hoop on a long shot to score Birmingham's only points in the first quarter. Hallock scored soon after having gained behind the foul line. McDowall added two points on a goal from midfloor and another unit on a free throw after Thomson had failed on a foul shot. Birmingham missed several shots as the period closed with a score of 8-2.

Start Come-back
H. Schwarze started a comeback by opening the second period with a long toss which scored. Thomson added one point to this from the foul line. A little snappy passing gave McDowall a chance to chalk up a goal from under the back board. Both Schwarze and Thomson failed on free throws before the latter found another chance to step to the foul line and add two points. Brown, Maroon guard scored on a long shot that found the cage and McDowall gained another point for the Aacorns on a foul shot, to bring the record 11-9 as the half ended.

After Birmingham gained the tipoff and failed to score, Hallock

having been fouled tossed two points, to which Aulph, who entered the game for Crossman, added another in the same fashion. Thomson stepped to the foul line soon after and gained another point for the villagers. Offered another chance in a series of fouls committed on both sides, Thomson failed. Aulph looped in a marker from midfloor following this and added still another foul point; Doherty, Maroon guard, scored on his only successful long shot of the evening at this time. Thomson committed his fourth personal foul and was removed from the contest. Cooney took his place. Hallock failed on a free throw and started a series of misses by both teams which Schwarze interrupted by dropping the ball in the basket from close in, placing the record at Royal Oak 17, Birmingham 14 at the conclusion of the third quarter.

See-saw Starts

After Hallock opened the final period with a long field goal Cooney retaliated in a like manner. This began a see-saw which when Aulph gained a unit on a free toss, to which Hallock added a short goal. Hallock missed a free throw and Cox scored his only goal of the game on a heave from midfloor directly afterwards. Birmingham following a time out with less than a minute to play, could not overcome Royal Oak's advantage and the scrap ended 22-18.
